October 28, 1978:

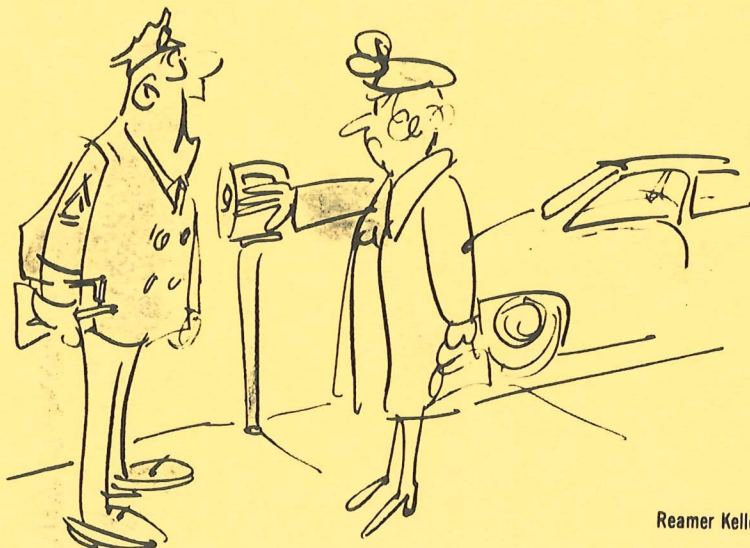
The Honourable Samuel Freedman, Chief Justice of Manitoba will lecture on "Challenges To The Rule Of Law".

The English Placement Test is being offered on Campus next Wednesday, November 1st at the following times:

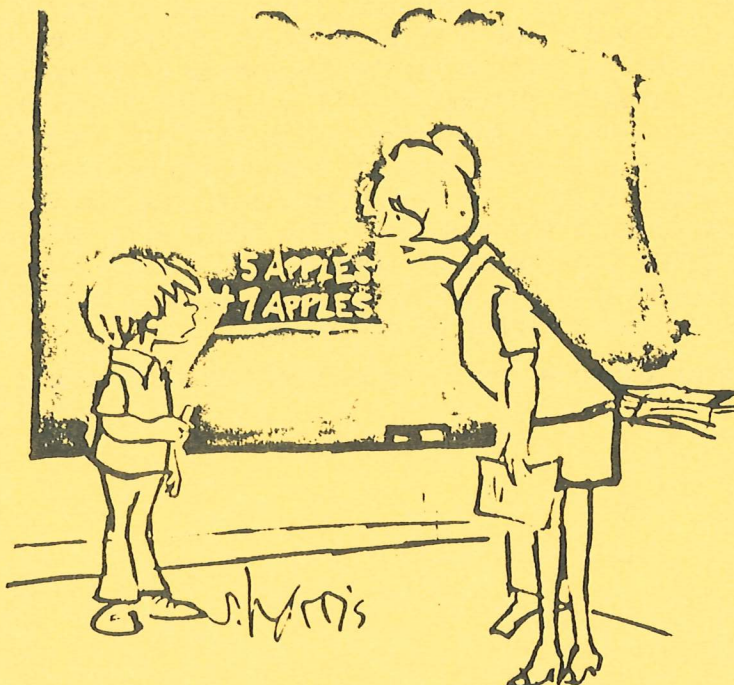

If you have any students who wish to take the test, but who do not attend one of the classes listed above, ask them to go to one of the above classrooms a short time prior to the start of the two and one-half hour test.

13) PERIPATETIC E.L.T. INSTRUCTORS

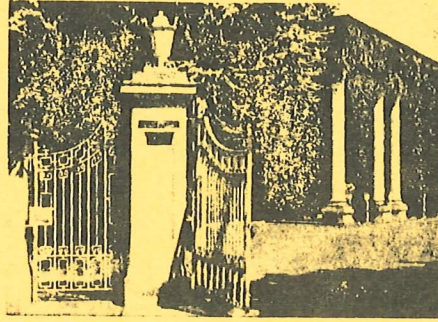

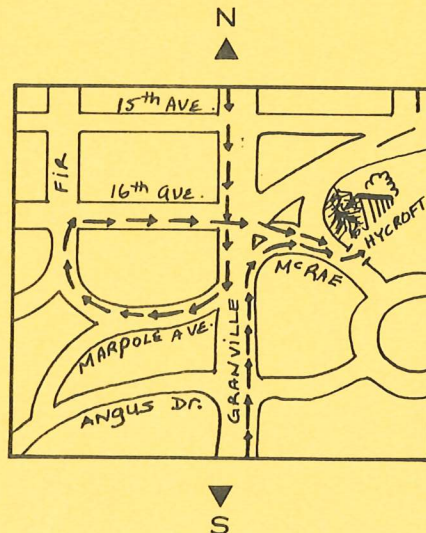
