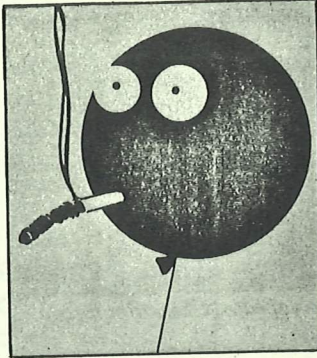
Non-smokers hall victory; implications for employers unclear

A decision handed down by the Ontario Workmen's Compensation Board this year, granting compensation to former East York Hydro employee Murdeena Johnson, could have far-reaching implications for offices and office workers throughout the country.

Johnson, in this appeal of a claim originally disallowed in 1977, was able to establish, with the assistance of lawyers from the Non-Smokers' Rights Association (NSRA), that exposure to tobacco smoke from fellow employees caused her to develop an "acute bronchial asthmatic condition" which forced her to leave the job.

According to the NSRA, this claim is the first in Canada which has been based "entirely upon injuries in the workplace attributed to second-hand tobacco smoke."

Gar Mahood, executive director of NSRA, suggests that "the implications are substantial." He maintains that the landmark decision demonstrates that the non-



smoking employee has the right to a clean environment and that the employer has the responsibility to provide it.

"If the employer does not regulate smoking, the employer leaves himself open to legal action," Mahood suggests.

Second-hand tobacco smoke is considered to be an "unnecessary" toxic substance, as opposed to, for example asbestos fibres in an asbestos mine which are "necessary," i.e., unavoidable, and which must simply be confined within certain limits. In the case of tobacco smoke, the employer has far

more stringent responsibilities.

In a case in the U.S. involving an employee of New Jersey Bell, a judge actually granted an injunction prohibiting smoking on these grounds.

The WCB itself, perhaps overwhelmed by the implications of its own decisions, has attempted to back off from establishing a clear-cut precedent.

First, in the decision itself it is suggested that certain conditions—a poor ventilation system—make Johnson's case somewhat unique. The NSRA counters that exposure to tobacco smoke alone, with or without modern air-conditioning, could cause injury.

Dr. William McCracken, executive director of Medical Services for the WCB, told reporters that the allowance "was made on dust, not cigarette smoke." However, the affidavit sworn by Johnson sets out 42 points of fact, in only *one* of which dust is mentioned.

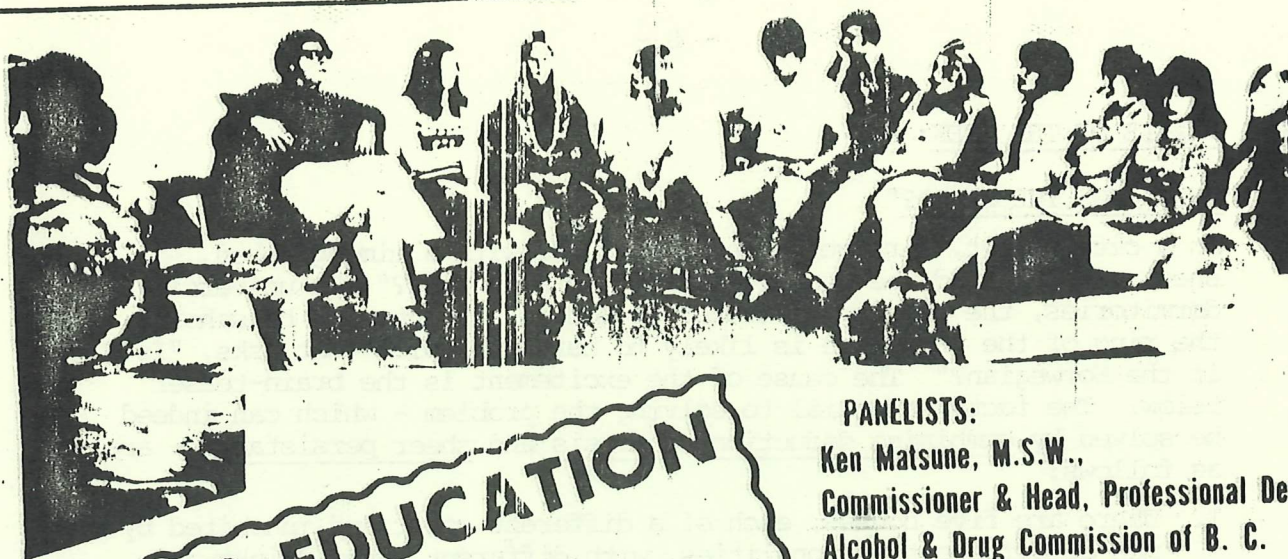
14) OFFICIAL LANGUAGE BURSARIES
