It is advisable that every young woman of childbearing age obtain an H.I. test from her family physician, to determine her level of immunity against German measles. If the H.I. test is 1:32 or less, the City of Vancouver Public Health Department advises the woman have her family doctor give her rubella vaccination; provided the woman is not pregnant, and that she is warned not to become pregnant for at least 3 months after receiving the vaccine.

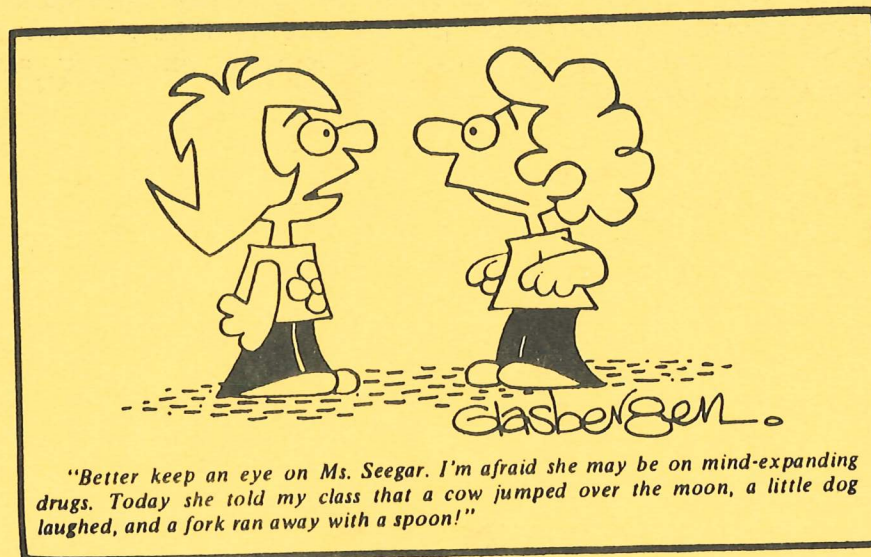

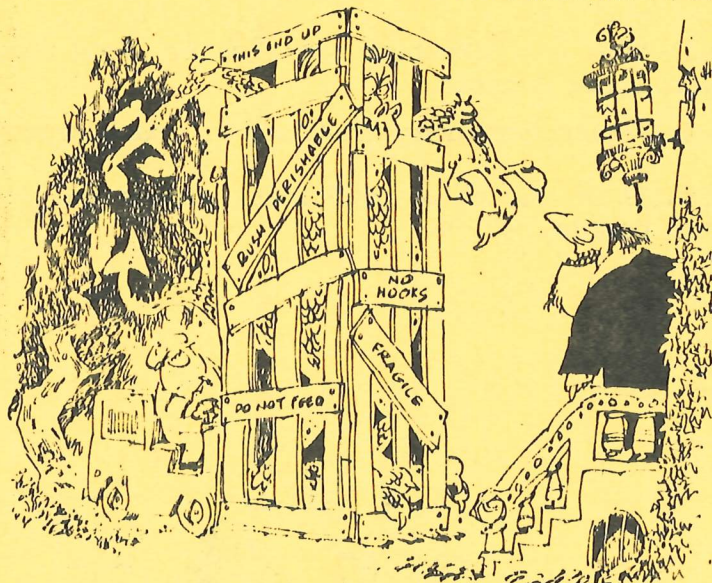
13) ALPHABET SOUP OR HOT WATER

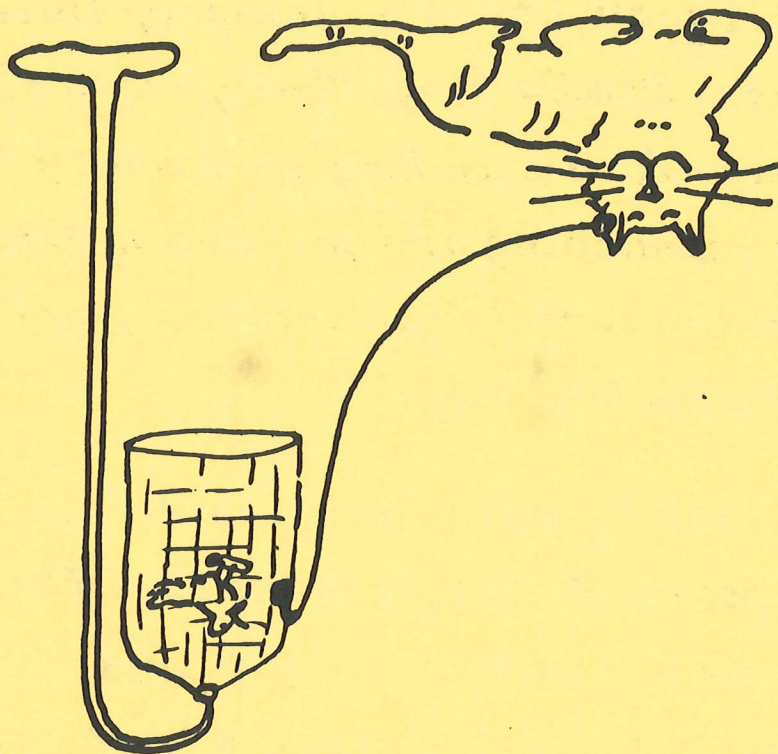
Receiving A STANDING OVATION
