
FROM THE MUSIC DEPARTMENT



Her historical survey, however, exposes racism as a deliberate political policy legislated by elected representatives and implemented by bureaucrats. The law that deprived an entire race of people of the right to vote was a law, not an attitude. When the Victoria School Board tried to segregate students because of their racial differences, they were exercising their power to implement policy, not simply manifesting an attitude. It is good to get this reality into the open where it can be examined, and Mary Ashworth succeeds in doing this without emotion or bias. . . .

"The miracle is that this book is not a depressing book. It makes you angry, it makes you sad—but it is also filled with hope, because you cannot help comparing 'now' with 'then.' You cannot help but see that the experiences of these five groups have resulted in the growth of a community determined not to allow the repetition of some of the more gross injustices of the past. The children of 'then' are the adults of 'now' living among us, a trojan horse, a conscience. . . .

"In addition to educators, two groups of people must read this book. Minority group members and their detractors. They will learn from these pages that indigenous racism is part of the ongoing reality of British Columbia - that their experience today is history repeating itself. But as they look around they will witness that the Chinese, Japanese, Native Indians, East Indians, and Doukhobors are slowly but surely overcoming the hurdles in their path - 'the forces which shaped them' retarded but could not stop their determined strides."







14) IT CAN HAPPEN TO YOU TOO.....


Please learn from what happened to the wife and mother-in-law of one of our instructors.
