COLLEGE BOARD MEETING

The final meeting of the present College Board took place on Wednesday, 1980 January 30.

Jim Kennedy announced that, after four years on the Board, he would be stepping down and that this would be his last meeting. Al Stusiak expressed, on behalf of faculty, his appreciation of all that Mr. Kennedy had done on behalf of the College.

The next Board will include three (now two) members of the Vancouver School Board as well as Mrs. E. W. Dean, a Burnaby trustee and Mrs. T. Maxreiter, Chairman of the Richmond School Board.

The College Principal reported on the Public Hearing at Grandview Elementary School on Tuesday evening, as well as presenting the Program Objectives and the College and Campus Evaluation Action Plans.

Resolutions were passed for the College to borrow:

- a) \$5,150,000 for the purchase of land at China Creek for the new King Edward Campus;
- b) \$3,857,309 for the purchase of Langara and V.V.I. properties from the Vancouver School Board;
- c) \$200,000 for planning funds; and
- d) \$600,000 for major renovations and public works projects.

A copy of the minutes of the meeting of 1980 January 23, the Institution Evaluation Action Plans and the Program Objectives have been placed in the Library.

An R.A.C. was approved for an additional Machinist course at V.V.I. to run from 10:00 p.m. to 4:30 a.m.! (This is not a typing error).

V.C.C. Vancouver Vocational Institute requires an Electricity and Industrial Electronics Instructor. The appointment must be filled as soon as possible.



Dear Sir:

I am writing in response to your request for more information concerning Block #11 on the insurance form which asks for "cause of injuries" wherein I put "Trying to do the job alone." You said you needed more information so I trust the following will be sufficient.

I am a bricklayer by trade and on the date of injuries I was working alone laying brick around the top of a four-storey building when I realized that I had about 500 pounds of brick left over. Rather than carry the bricks down by hand, I decided to put them into a barrel and lower them by a pulley which was fastened to the top of the building. I secured the end of the rope at ground level and went up to the top of the building and loaded the bricks into the barrel and swung the barrel out with the bricks in it. I then went down and untied the rope, holding it securely to insure the slow descent of the barrel.

As you will note on Block #6 of the insurance form, I weigh 145 pounds. Due to my shock at being jerked off the ground so swiftly, I lost my presence of mind and forgot to let go of the rope. Between the second and third floors I met the barrel coming down. This accounts for the bruises and lacerations on my upper body.

Regaining my presence of mind, I held tightly to the rope and proceeded rapidly up the side of the building, not stopping until my right hand was jammed in the pulley. This accounts for the broken thumb.

Despite the pain, I retained my presence of mind and held tightly to the rope. At approximately the same time, however, the barrel of bricks hit the ground and the bottom fell out of the barrel. Devoid of the weight of the bricks, the barrel now weighed about 50 pounds. I again refer you to Block #6 and my weight.

As you would guess, I began a rapid descent. In the vicinity of the second floor I met the barrel coming up. This explains the injuries to my legs and lower body. Slowed only slightly, I continued my descent, landing on the pile of bricks. Fortunately, my back was only sprained, and the internal injuries were minimal.

I am sorry to report, however, that at this point, I finally lost my presence of mind and let go of the rope, and as you can imagine, the empty barrel crashed down on me.

t trust this answers your concern. Please know that I am finished "Trying to do the job alone." How about you?
