## BJRT CURRICULUM VALIDATION - ONE DAY WORKSHOP

On Monday, March 17th, a panel of nine members from throughout the province met with K.E.C. faculty to participate in a one day workshop, conducted by Jean Cranstoun to validate the BJRT framework of general objectives. This workshop, funded by the Ministry followed receipt of written critiques from even larger groups.

At the end, our visitors spoke highly of the workshop and the hospitality of King Edward Campus.

The unexpected outcomes were:

- a) verbal commitments from BJRT faculty from three other colleges to review their objectives in the light of the framework produced here; and
- b) expressions of belief that the framework of objectives produced apply equally to urban and rural situations and should be valuable to BJRT instructors in widely varying situations.
