COLLEGE BOARD MEETING, 1980 MAY 21

Wednesday's meeting was, on the whole, a quiet peaceful one, almost devoid of controversy. The public was made up of one Dean, who was there to respond to questions on his contribution to the agenda, and a senior Regional Office person.

- 1) In the College Principal's Report (copy in the Library) mention was made of:
 - a) K.E.C. increase of enrolment from 3976 in May 1979 to 4785 in May 1980.
 - b) Secondment of Ted Anderson to the Ministry of Education to work on Facilitators and Instructors Skills Training.
 - c) Secondment of Mary Selman to the Ministry of Education as EIT consultant for another year.
 - d) Ministry of Education allocation of \$8,300 for development of an anthology for the Canadian Viewpoints courses.
- 2) The Comparative Financial Statement for the 1979-80 financial year, which showed King Edward Campus to have had a net surplus of \$16,000 in a \$6.4 million budget.
- 3) Education and Student Service Report. Langara Campus reported on how that campus intends to cope with students who are deficient in reading and writing skills.
- 4) Authorization was given for Langara Campus to get started on architectural work for campus expansion, although project approval is not anticipated before February 1981.
- 5) The College is pursuing alternative means of supporting Day Care facilities in the new campuses.



- 6) The Board approved the allocation of \$160,000 of earned interest to help cover the King Edward Campus budget shortfall.
- 7) The Board approved a R.A.C. for twenty more B.T.S.D. level 4 students for the current financial year, to bring the numbers in line with 1979-80.



FROM U.B.C. REPORTS

New UBC vice-president appointed

Dr. James M. Kennedy will become Vice-President, University Services, for UBC on July 1.

He succeeds C.J. Connaghan, currently Vice-President, Administrative Services, who will be leaving the University after a five-year term to return to private business.

The appointment of Dr. Kennedy, who has been director of the UBC Computing Centre since 1966, was announced by Leslie Peterson, Q.C., chairman of the University's Board of Governors, following a board meeting held in Prince George Monday.

Dr. Kennedy, a native of Ottawa who obtained his Ph.D. in theoretical physics at Princeton University, will assume responsibility for the University's non-academic support services, including Employee Relations, Physical Plant, Purchasing, Facilities, Planning and Traffic and Security. Overall responsibility for the UBC Computing Centre will also come under his new office.

UBC President Douglas T. Kenny said the University was fortunate to be able to call on Dr. Kennedy to provide leadership for University support services during the 1980s. "Dr. Kennedy's experience with computerized management information will be a great strength to the University administration in the years ahead," the President said.

Dr. Kenny paid tribute to the contribution Mr. Connaghan had made in the reorganization and guidance of administrative services since joining the University. "Mr. Connaghan is an outstanding example of a person who took five years out of a successful business career to serve in the public sector," Dr. Kenny said.

Mr. Connaghan, a former president of the Construction Labor Relations Association of B.C., and author of a major report on labor-management relations in West Germany, is leaving to form his own consulting firm in Vancouver. He is a former member of

the UBC Board of Governors and a UBC graduate.

"I fully expect," President Kenny said, "that Mr. Connaghan will continue his long and close association with the University, which began as a student when he served as president of the Alma Mater Society and which continued when he was employed in Eastern Canada, where he served as a contact person for our alumni association."

Dr. Kennedy, who received his B.A. and M.A. from the University of Toronto before going on to Princeton, spent 12 years with Atomic Energy of Canada before joining UBC in 1966. In addition to his duties as director of the Computing Centre, he served as acting head of the computer science department in 1968-69 during its development. He continues to hold the rank of professor of computer science.

VICE-PRESIDENT

Dr. Kennedy served as special assistant to the president from October, 1979, to March, 1980, when he chaired the Information Systems Task Force which looked into information systems development at UBC. He served on the board of Vancouver Community College from 1976 to 1980 and was board chairman for two years.

Dear Mr. Goard:

I refer you to your letter dated May 1, 1980, regarding the recent Order in Council providing for double contributions by teachers during periods of approved leave of absence, in order to have that leave of absence recorded for pension purposes.

I wish to confirm that Section 5(3) of the College Pension Act gives the Commissioner and the employer the authority to accept double contributions by employees covered by the Act during periods of leave of absence and have that absence recognized for pension purposes. The difference between the College Pension Act and the Teachers' Pensions Act is that the conditions under which a teacher may make double contributions is contained in regulation form, which becomes part of the statute, whereas the College Pension Act gives this authority to the Commissioner. Nevertheless, it is the intention of the Commissioner to exercise these powers in a manner similar to the regulations provided under the Teachers' Pensions Act.

Consequently, where an employee is on leave of absence approved by the employer, such requests should be forwarded to myself for consideration and action.

EXCHANGE FOR A CHANGE?


