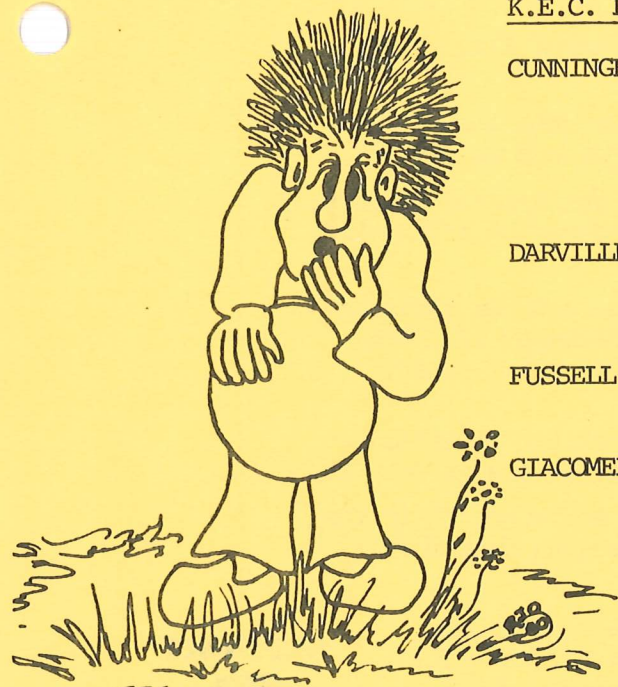

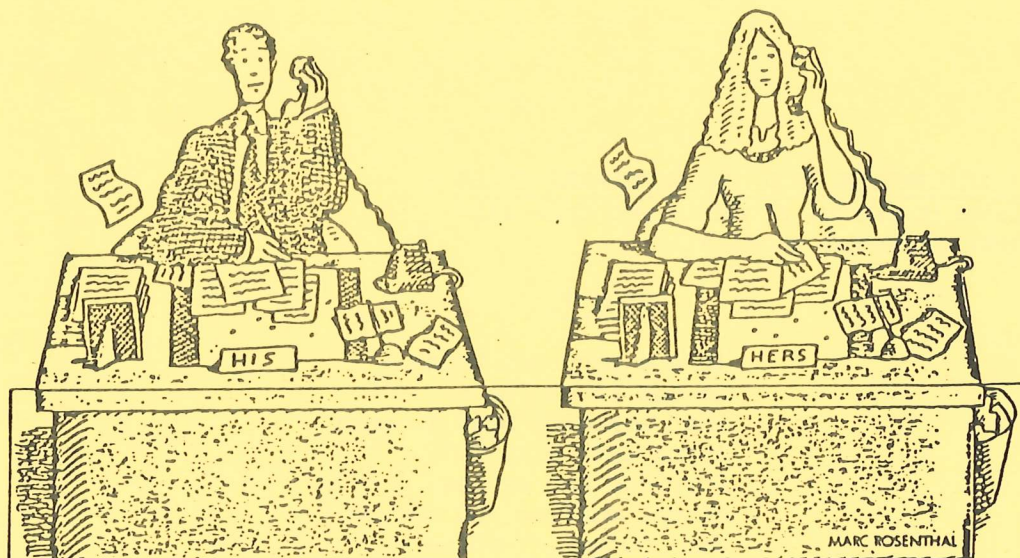

October 22, 1980 at the Regional Office.

1. College Principal's Report to the Board

The only item concerning KEC was approval of a "Feasibility Study of a BTSD program for the Visually Impaired". (G. Nelson will be undertaking a one-month study on this topic starting on Monday, October 27, 1980.

A copy of the Principal's Report is now in the library.

2. Facilities

It was hoped that the zoning bye-law for the China Creek Site would receive Council's approval at the Vancouver City Council's meeting on Tuesday. However, it was not on the Council's Agenda because the Planning Department had not prepared the documents for the Council. It should be on the next Council Meeting Agenda on November 3, 1980.

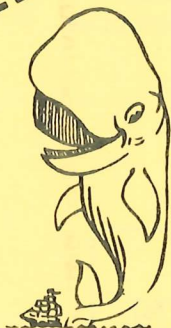
3. Student Fees

4. A Request for Additional Classes for 100 students in English Language Training from November 30, 1980 to March 31, 1981 at the Mount Pleasant and Strathcona Centres was approved.
