# VANCOUVER COMMUNITY COLLEGE BOARD MEETING

After a two-month summer recess, the College Board met in regular session on Wednesday evening, September 9th.

The President's report to the Board touched on a variety of matters which have transpired during the course of the summer. A copy of the report has been placed in our library.

The College Board dealt with the question of revised tuition fees but, before discussing the matter, the Board heard briefs from the V.V.I. Student Society, the K.E.C. Student Society and the National Union of Students.

After lengthy debate, the Board approved a motion requesting the Minister of Education to approve an increase in tuition fees. The new tuition fees, to be effective 1982 January 01, will be \$175 per four-month term for full-time students - \$42.00 per month.

In two subsequent motions, the Board voted to;

- a) request a meeting with the Minister of Education to discuss funding of post-secondary education and that a student representative from each campus be present for the meeting with the Minister; and
- b) urge the Minister of Education to provide tuition-free adult basic education.

Finally, on fees, the Board approved a request of the K.E.C. Student Society to increase Student Society fees for K.E.C. students from \$3.20 to \$5.40 per four-month term, effective 1982 January 01.

Background documentation on the above as well as information on other agenda items not included in this report, the President's report, and the minutes of the Board meeting of 1981 July 08 have been placed in our library for the perusal of those interested.


### TYPING:

Complete a work order form for materials to be typed. Please allow 2 or 3 days for typing; longer for extensive jobs. If proofreading is not requested, material will proceed directly from the typist to the print room. Every effort will be made to complete typing as quickly as possible.

# OFFSET PRESS:

Complete a work order form, allowing 2 to 3 days for completion. Depending on the size of the job concerned and the work load, the printing operators endeavor to return short runs (20 copies and under) within one day; longer runs within 2 or 3 days. Completed work is placed in mail boxes or on the tables outside the print room. Faculty are advised to check these daily.

# ADCIS 82: -7Computer Literacy, Intelligent CAI

1982 ADCIS Conference Vancouver, B.C., Canada June 7-11, 1982

The Annual ADCIS Conference is a forum for both formal and informal sharing of computer-based instruction ideas, experiences, research findings, courseware, procedures, policies, standards, and educational strategies. Academic, commercial, government, and private groups are invited to attend and participate by discussing ways in which the field of computer-based instruction can be properly advanced. Demonstrations of hardware, software, and courseware are also solicited.

#### Themes:

Papers on all topics relevant to computer-based instruction are welcome, but topics on this year's themes will be given top priority. The 1982 Conference will have two themes, both of which will help people make better use of computers and help computers become more useful for education:

# Computer Literacy

The rapid advances in technology which have made educational uses of computers possible and affordable have left many people behind. Educators need to be computer-literate not only to explore using computers as instructional aids, but also to meet today's need for teaching computer concepts.

# Intelligent CAI

Use of computers in instruction has attempted to adapt the instructional process to the individual student in the most friendly, encouraging, and effective ways possible; however, programming the necessary interactions has been extremely difficult. The level of adaptivity has therefore been a tradeoff with courseware development expense.

Research in expert systems techniques for teaching and modelling learning promises real breakthroughs in computer-assisted instruction. Using these new approaches, "intelligent" teaching systems demonstrate new levels of adaptivity which may be the future of computer-based instruction.

Types of submitted presentations given at ADCIS Conferences are: Topic Presentations, Project Reports, Commercial Seminars, and Panel Discussions.




