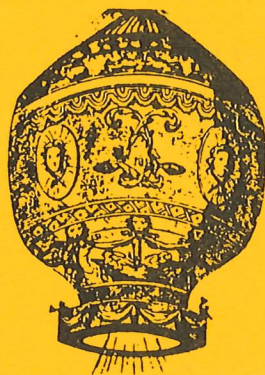

### COLLEGE BOARD MEETING

The College Board met in regular session on Wednesday, September 30th.

President A.S. Manera's report to the Board touched on several items of interest:

- Allen Andrews' new book, The Scottish Canadians;
- New campus up-date;
- Positive response to College Board's request for extension of lease on present facilities to end of 1982;
- A 1982-83 budget exercise the College has been requested to do whereby next year's operating budget is restricted to this year's absolute dollars, and
- Temporary funded courses and contract services.

Reports for the Board's information were submitted on

- Enrollment during the 1980/81 fiscal period,
- Follow-up survey of graduates, and
- Financial statement for 5-month period ending 1981 August 31.

A report had been prepared by the College President, at the Board's request, on tuition fees for adult basic education students. Because steps have been taken by the Ministry to make funding (grants-in-aid) available for A.B.E. students, the Board received Mr. Manera's report and agreed not to pursue the matter at this time.

The Board approved a Langara Campus Student Society request to increase the basic Student Society fees from \$3 to \$5 per student per 4-month term, effective 1982 January 01.

The Board authorized the sale of debentures in the amount of \$1,000,000 for capital facilities projects for the new King Edward Campus and the V.V.I.

Copies of the Board meeting minutes of September 9th, the President's report and background material prepared apropos the above and other items have been placed in our library for the perusal of those interested.

FROM A KING EDWARD CAMPUS STUDENT

Filled with trepidation, self confidence vanished, I arrived at the college where I was enrolling as an adult student, retaking grade 12 after many years absence.

The campus was fairly familiar to me since I had completed a course for women some weeks prior. Nevertheless, I was shaking inside as I entered the building and made my way to the registration desk. The excitement I had felt just yesterday about returning to school was now replaced with fear, doubt and apprehension. Part of me wanted to be anywhere but here at this moment; part wanted to stay to see what lay ahead and part of me wanted to calm my fear-filled body.

Attempting to breathe slowly, I awaited my turn at the registration desk. Forms completed, student card in hand, I headed to class, passing many young, fresh, eager, confident looking faces in the hallways. Suddenly, doubt assailed me. Not one old looking face in sight! Am I to be the only older student amidst a sea of young people? Panic clutched my throat; fear grasped my heart, and flight seized my legs turning me in the opposite direction. Almost running, I found the washroom. I stayed in there for what seemed like an eternity until my body relaxed and my mind controlled my feelings. Then, somewhat calmer, I found my class; I entered, introduced myself to the instructor and found a seat. Looking around I saw students much younger than I, yet now it didn't bother me. I had overcome my fear; the worst was over replaced by a growing excitement and eagerness to learn. Slowly, I looked around the room, familiarizing myself with the surroundings. As I watched and listened to the instructor, I liked her immediately and knew I could learn from her. Now I relaxed more. Before long the class was over; I had enjoyed it.

Two more classes followed. After meeting both instructors, becoming familiar with the classrooms, the daily schedule, collecting texts and assigned study materials, I felt more at ease in my new surroundings. School was exciting! I felt proud to be part of this large learning institute surrounded by knowledge.

The school day drew to a close. Tired, emotionally drained, I left the campus, books in hand. Outside, I looked at the sprawling building which contained the knowledge I wanted. For the next few months it would be my haven of learning. I was a student again enthused and eager to return the next day to advance this new chapter in my life.

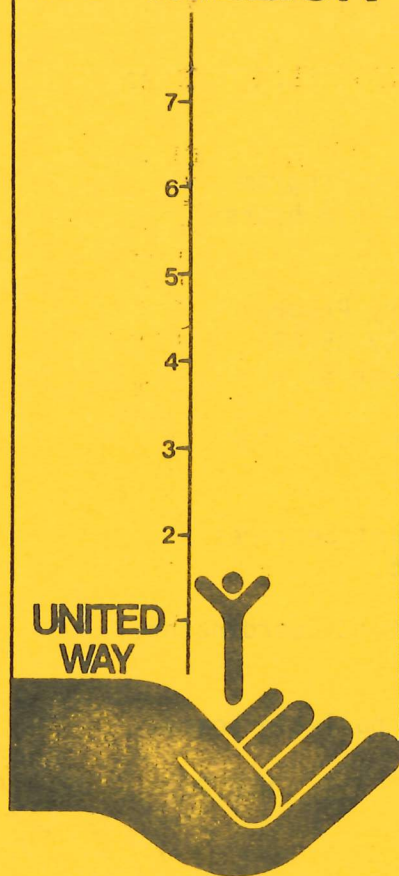

## ***Donations top \$1.5 million in first week***

The United Way announced Thursday that donations in the first week of the 1981 Lower Mainland campaign already total more than \$1.5 million.

Campaign chairman George Fierheller said the current total of \$1,504,206, in dollars or percentage, is more than the United Way has collected in the first week of any other campaign.

The amount, almost exclusively corporate donations, is 19 per cent of the United Way's target of \$7.9 million. The campaign began Saturday and ends Nov. 20.

Volunteers are asking working persons to donate one day's pay a year by payroll deduction.

Mailed appeals have also been delivered to the households of 18 Lower Mainland municipalities.

This year the United Way is campaigning on behalf of 83 volunteer social service agencies.

Donations may be mailed or delivered to United Way headquarters at 1625 West Eighth, Vancouver, B.C., V6J 1T9. A receipt will be provided for income tax purposes.
