in many instances that help can only come through one of the more than 80 United Way supported services.

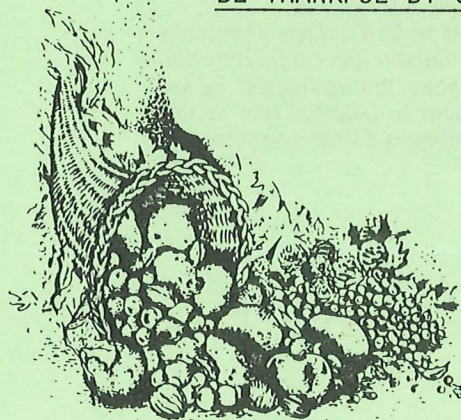
It's good to know that, should we ever need such assistance, the United Way and its many member agencies stand ready to help.

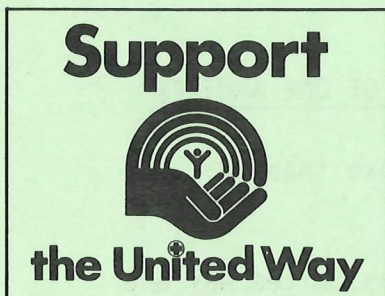

**College funds  
reservations  
discounted**

Fears that community college budgets for 1982 will be held at this year's level are unfounded, Education Minister Brian Smith said Tuesday.

He was commenting on statements made by Tony Manera, president of Vancouver Community College, who said all colleges had been told to tighten their belts and to indicate what the impact would be "if we receive the same absolute dollars next year as we did this year."

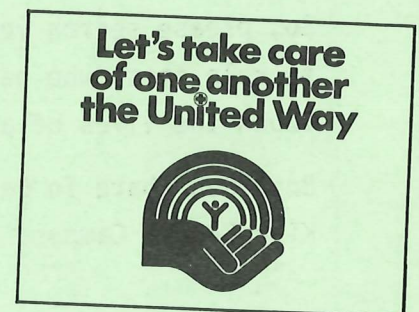
Manera said that to hold the line would in effect mean a 20 per cent budget cut when inflation and wage increases were considered.

Smith said Manera was reacting too quickly to queries from his ministry asking colleges and other educational institutions to list their priorities for next year.

Said Smith: "I'm sure that ministry officials are trying to ascertain the needs and priorities of community colleges because the data is required before meaningful budget talks can be held."

"They are not trying to scare anyone, just collecting information."

Smith said he had no idea what funds would be available for community colleges next year "but to suggest we are warning them to hold the line at this year's spending is a little premature."



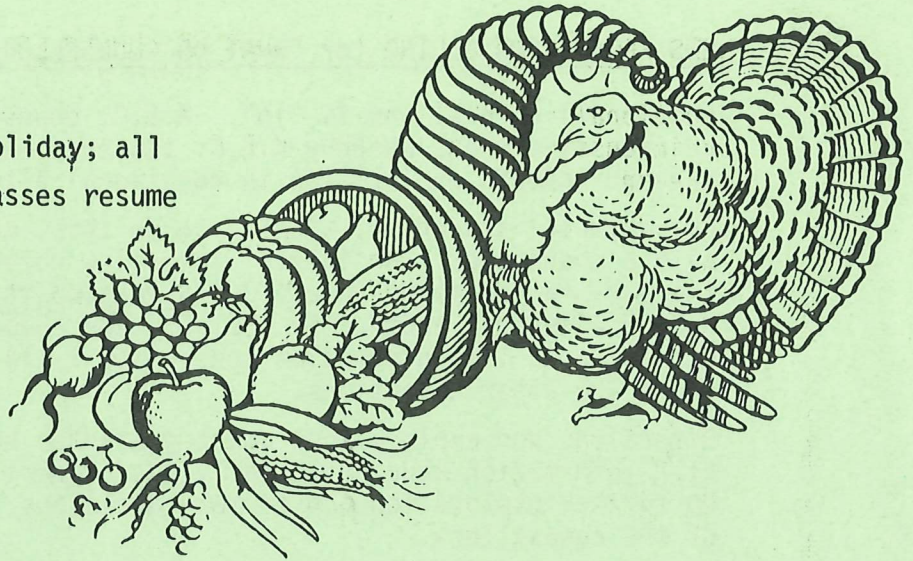

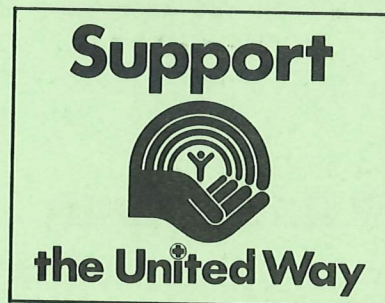

### NEWS FROM COUNSELLING (or "WHAT DO COUNSELLORS DO?")

Vocational counselling is "in". K.E.C. counsellors have developed an intensive means whereby K.E.C. students may, if they wish, undertake an indepth exploration in vocational alternatives.

For example, student X, wishing to do this, makes an appointment with a counsellor. An initial interview determines the directions the exploration might take. One direction is the Counselling Resource Centre, another is CHOICES, the computer program from Ottawa, with its information concerning 1,114 (Canadian) vocations. There are other directions.

Directions and explorations don't guarantee answers, however. They give information about alternatives. Student X must be prepared to do further exploration and to make decisions, with the ongoing help of the counsellors.

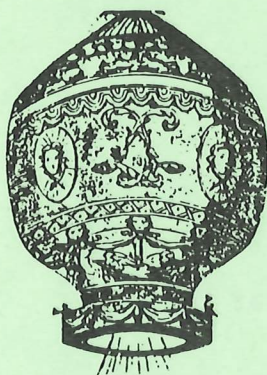

LOUISE BESSETTE, brilliant 22 year-old Montreal pianist, is the 1981 winner of the prestigious Eckhardt-Gramatté Competition. Held annually since 1976, this competition pays tribute to the career of the distinguished composer-pianist-violinist, the late Sonia Eckhardt-Gramatté, and her work on behalf of contemporary music and its importance to young Canadian pianist, string players and singers.

A recent graduate of the Montreal Conservatory of Music, LOUISE BESSETTE currently is studying in New York with Eugene List. Her recital, the third in the Vancouver Community College Music Department's Friday evening series, opens the trans-Canada recital tour which is a major part of her competition award. Her programme is a judicious blend of traditional and contemporary idioms. It begins with a Busoni transcription of a Bach chorale, and includes music of Brahms, Liszt, Debussy. A work by the competition's dedicatée, and the test piece, required of all competitors, commissioned from the Montreal composer, Alain Gagnon.

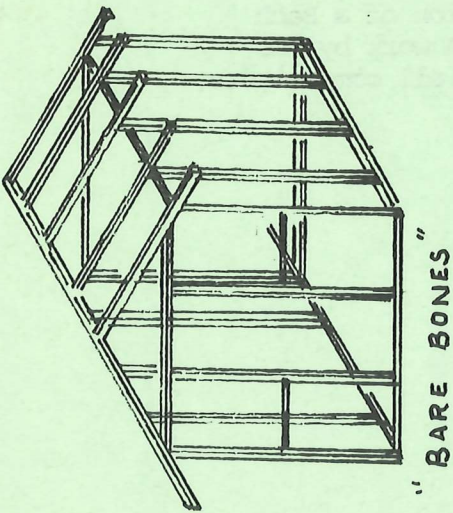

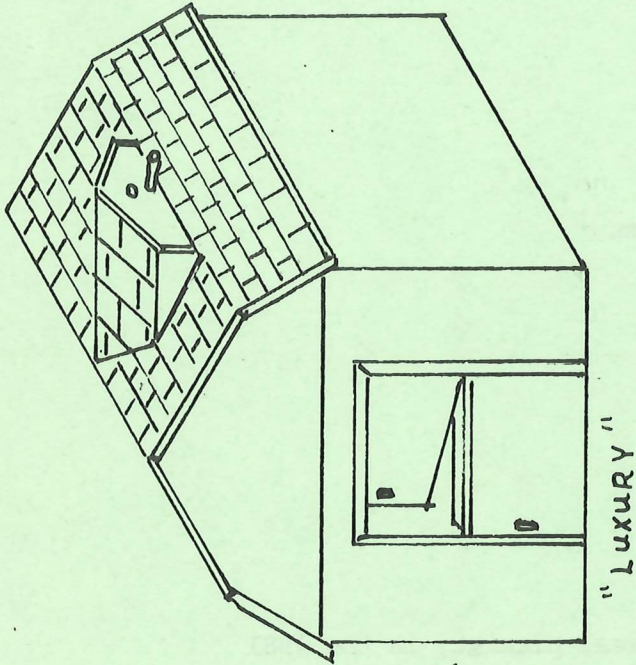

The luxury model has a cedar shingle roof, floor, bird house and dutch door. It can be used as a storage shed for bicycles, lawnmowers, etc., a children's playhouse, or small cabin for overflow guests (in warm weather.)

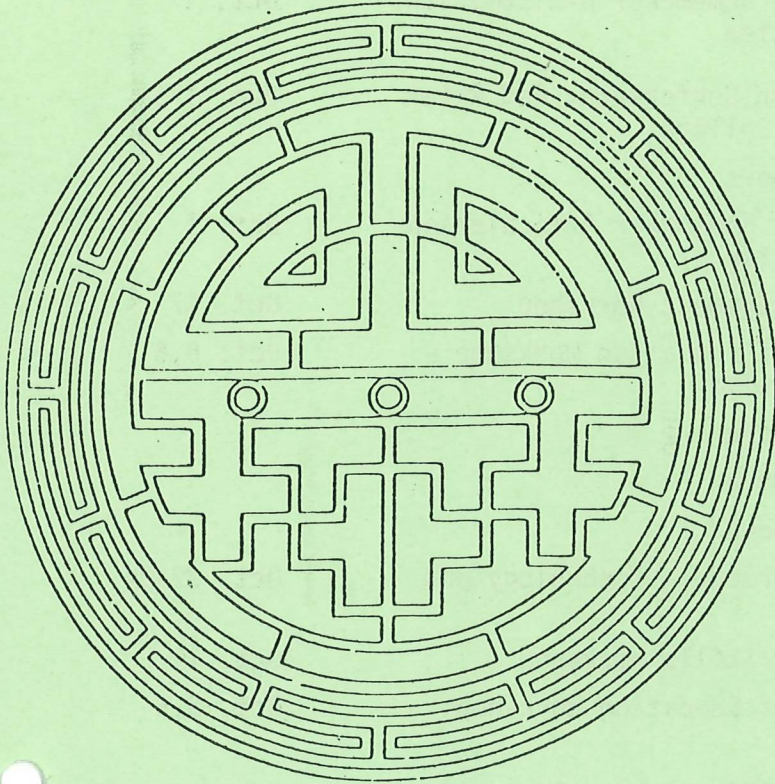
Prices range from \$80.00 to \$375.00 depending on the amount of material used.
