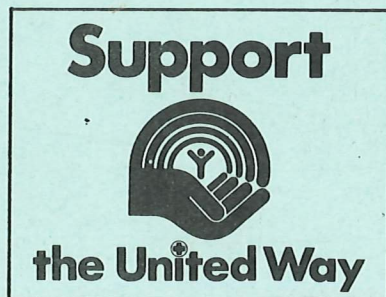
A special thank you to Grant for his great idea and the time and effort he and the other cooks contributed to the rally.

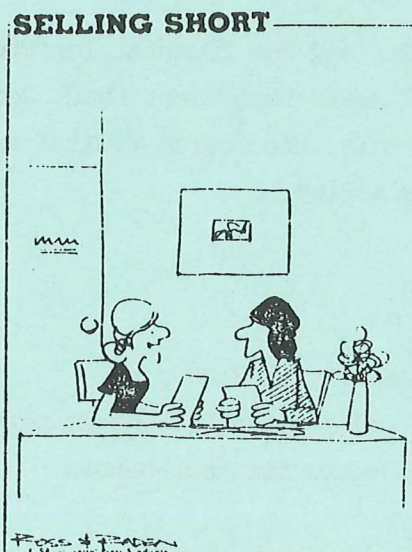
Immigrant Services Society

Because of these involvements, counsellors have built up an invaluable network of contacts and referral persons and, on the other hand, have had many prospective students referred to K.E.C. programs.

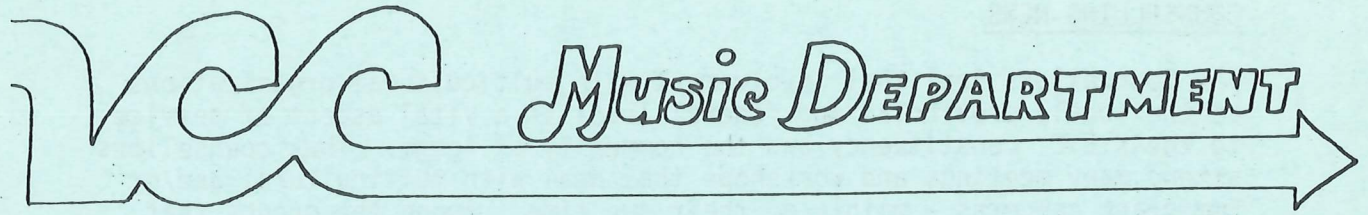
If anyone is interested in the activities of the above organizations, Counsellors will be glad to give this information.
