# COLLEGE BOARD MEETING

Vancouver Community College Board met on Wednesday, December 9th, for its regular meeting.

A copy of the College President's report has been placed in the library for the information of those interested. Included on the Board's agenda were the following:

- 1. The Board approved the following motion for submission to the federal government:
  - "That Vancouver Community College Board urge the Federal Government to increase the amount of money (at present \$44 million) by an appropriate amount so that no subsidized seats will be lost for the Manpower sponsored programs."
- 2. At the request of the Board last July, a report had been prepared on "differential tuition fees." (The college officials' report is on pages 12 and 13 of the Board's agenda.) After lengthy discussion of the report and the concept of a differential fee structure, the Board approved a motion requesting the administration to prepare a report indicating how a differential fee structure could be applied.
- 3. In response to Vancouver Parks' Board Superintendent V. Kondroskey's request for V.C.C. to "contribute significantly" to the re-development of North China Creek Park, the Board was unanimous in its statement that, in purchasing the property for the new campus, the purchase price included \$750,000 for "improvements" for the surrounding area. The request was refused.
- 4. K.E.C. Student Society Office Manager Don Whitney drew to the Board's attention the difficulty of Homemaker Program students in getting financial assistance through the B.C. Student Loan/Bursary fund. The Board approved a motion requesting officials to report and advise respecting the students referred to above and on such students in other programs.

The Board minutes of the November 18th meeting and supporting documents have been placed in the library.


## INDICATION OF NEED FOR E.L.T. CLASSES

If you want to know more about alcohol, its effects on your body, drinking-driving, and how to feel good about saying "No, thanks", take advantage of the Health Services Health Week.





# CAN WE MAKE A DEAL?

That's the title of a new book for A.B.E. students, by Richard Darville of VCC King Edward Campus. It explains, in basic English, the fundamentals of contract law. Most of the book is made up of interest-catching stories whose characters get bad deals and end up in legal cases. This leads up to explanations of how to use consumer and labour law.

A Teacher Resource Manual includes a variety of student exercises for each chapter: Reviewing the Story, Going Further, Vocabulary, Organizational Language (legal, company, government bureaucracy and trade union terms), and Idioms and Expressions (especially for ABE/ESL "Bridge" students). A Teacher's Introduction shows the teaching method that the book relies upon, and how to use it in the classroom.

The materials were tested in three classrooms and were well received by the students. Review of the legal content was provided by the Legal Services Society. This book is available from:




