Special Project Proposals 1983

In the Spring of each year, the Continuing Education Division of the Ministry of Education invites colleges and school boards to submit proposals for innovative projects which could have application within any area of the Continuing Education spectrum. This could include most program areas in which King Edward Campus is involved.

However, we cannot wait until the Spring before work is started in preparing the groundwork for the proposals.

Procedure B.1 of Policy 6.2.1.1, Special Project Proposals states, "In February of each year, individual faculty, groups of faculty, or departments may prepare, using the "Application for Continuing Education Project Funds" form, special project proposals for consideration by the appropriate department head who will submit the proposal, with or without comment, to his division chairman or dean if there is no division chairman."

In March the proposals will be considered and selected by your division chairman in consultation with the department heads.

It is important that the "Guidelines" for the proposals as set out by the Ministry of Education be followed. The chances are greater for acceptance if they have community support, preferably in writing.

King Edward Campus has been involved in many Special Projects in the past. The present on-going Homefront Learning Program, for example, is one of them.

Your department head, and/or Jean Cranstoun, the curriculum consultant, will be pleased to help you draft your proposal. I would recommend that projects be budgeted in the \$3,000.00 - \$12,000.00 range so that they may be more readily acceptable, and that sufficient names be included for typing, visual illustrations and duplication be allowed for.

WELL, THAT'S ALL VERY WELL for you. If we at Leisure & TV Week read the mandatory opening line of our short story contest one more time we'll be releasing the emergency brake with something stronger than absent-mindedness.

Well before the postman, strangely complaining of hernia, brought the last of 329 contest entries, we were overwhelmed with your responses.

Our winner is James Joly of New Westminster.

This is not the first Joly byline in The Vancouver Sun; he worked summers here as a reporter, starting at age 17, from 1972-76 while he was a university student. (Slay those charges of nepotism: none of our judges made the connection.)

Joly left The Sun in 1976 to travel: movie extra in the Philippines, ski-lift operator in New Zealand and gold miner in Australia. He returned to Simon Fraser University for a bachelor's degree in general studies in 1980 and is now, at 27, a part-time activity worker at Woodlands School. He told us he'd considered taking up law but figured he'd spend that time learning to be a writer.

To our seasonally named winner go our best wishes and our first book prize: Rodolf Bery's *Odyssey: Mirror of the Mediterranean*.

Our second-place writer, Greta Nelson of Burnaby, wins a copy of *The Story of the Royal Family*, by Don Coolican (Collins), for her tale of supernatural friendship, *Come All Ye Faithful*.

And third place, with a prize of Robert Genn's *In Praise of Painting* (Merritt), goes to Mark Hawkes of North Vancouver, for *Yes, Virginia, There Really Is . . .* the story of a Santa Claus whose faith is renewed in Vancouver's East Side.

As for honorable mention, we'd like to thank all who tried, but in particular

Rejanne Charpentier, with a delightful story of whales delving into human emotions, disqualified herself with a history of writing fiction for Radio-Canada. The story, her first in English apart from her University of B.C. creative writing course, augurs for a bright future in her adopted tongue. And Judy Wagner of Vancouver charmed us with *In Session*, a doctor-patient dialogue cleverly leading to a marriage proposal.

Stories ranged from the seasonally apocryphal to the cosmically apocalyptic. We had a 14-year-old student's submission and one from an 86-year-old; we had several entries from Florida, one from a woman on a B.C. ranch and one arrived with a Brussels, Belgium, postmark.

It seems the further the writers were from Vancouver, the more desirable was a basement suite in Shaughnessy. And a curiosity we'll leave to the sociologists: many women writers took the man's point of view, positing the "she" of our mandatory beginning as a much blither character than the male writers generally did.
