



The Board elected Peter Hebb as chairman and Elizabeth Jarvis was elected vice-chairman.

The Board approved a lease extension for King Edward Campus for the period 1982 April 01 to December 31.

The Board approved a contract, amounting to \$67,962, whereby the College will provide for the training of vocational instructors from Zimbabwe. The contract is with U.B.C. and the College's instruction will be provided at the V.V.I.

The B.C. Union Catalogue contract, administered by V.C.C., with the Ministry was approved by the Board. The contract is for \$95,000.

A policy entitled "Waiving of Tuition Fees for Employees" (printed in its entirety on the next page of this issue of the $\underline{\text{Times}}$) was approved by the Board.

A number of other items were on the Board's agenda, all of which are documented in the agenda material.

WAIVING OF TUITION FEES

FOR EMPLOYEES

Concerning: President All Employees


President Approval:

POLICY:

- A.1 A College employee, eligible for benefits (other than statutory benefits) may enroll in a College course and the tuition fee for the course may be waived, provided that:
 - a) the employee's attendance will not displace a feepaying student or result in additional costs to the College; and,
 - b) a sufficient number of fee-paying students are enrolled to warrant the course being mounted.
- A.2 The waiver of tuition fees shall not include the waiver of materials, laboratory, student society or similar fees.
- A.3 Where a collective agreement or other terms of employment cover the waiving of tuition fees, the terms of such agreement or terms of employment shall apply.

PROCEDURE:

- B.1 The employee shall present a written request for tuition fee waiver, endorsed by the employee's dean/director, to the College official responsible for the registration of the course being requested.
- NOTE: This amended policy incorporates and thus_replaces Policy No. 2.5.1.1.



HEARTSAVER

Last week I took a 4-hour class, through VCC Continuing Ed, called Basic Heartsaver. I can't think when I've used 4 hours more productively. We were taught, and practiced maneuvers for rescuing choking victims (restaurant coronaries), and how to resuscitate a person whose heart and lungs have ceased functioning, until help arrives. Resuscitation is practiced on life-sized dolls named "Annies." Annies lights flash to let you know if you're getting air into the lungs, etc. The "Annies" were designed by a man whose daughter of the same name died on the beach after a drowning accident because none of the on-lookers knew CPR. The dolls all have the face of the original Annie.

In Seattle, one in five people has been trained in CPR. They have lowered their deaths from heart attacks dramatically.

- 2. VIDEOTEX A PUBLIC FORUM TO DISCUSS ITS IMPACT




