VANCOUVER COMMUNITY COLLEGE BOARD MEETING

The College Board met yesterday evening for its regular meeting.

As a first item of business, the Board Chairman read into the public minutes three motions approved by the Board last week Wednesday at its private meeting. The motions dealt with;

- a) a freeze on hiring, travel and conferences;
- b) the request of the Board to meet with the Minister of Education and his Cabinet colleagues; and
- c) the Board advising the several funding agencies respecting the College's serious funding deficiencies.

The President's report covered 19 items; a copy of the report is on file in our library.

The Bursar's report on the College's financial situation at the 10 month mark (January 31st) indicated the College had underspent its budget by 0.4%.

The College and Institute Act requires a "sunset report" from each college, etc., by March 31, 1982 and each subsequent five-year period. V.C.C.'s "sunset report" has been prepared and was approved for submission to the Minister.

Board member Barry Sleight was appointed as the Board's representative to B.C.A.C.

A.C.C.C. is having budgetary problems. The president of the association has asked for a special grant from V.C.C. (as well as from other member institutions). The Board did not take any action respecting the request.

A request had been submitted to the Board respecting the March 12th students' "Day of Action" concerning proposed cutbacks in post-secondary funding. After lengthy debate, the Board "received" the student letter. In a subsequent motion "to endorse the students' Day of Action", and, after lengthy debate, the motion was defeated.

The Board Chairman reported on the Board's "retreat" last Wednesday evening. The items he touched on included the possibility of re-introducing a Board Committee structure and holding meetings of the Board at the campuses as well as at the Regional Offices.

Board member Tilly Marxreiter reported on a Management Advisory Council (MAC) meeting. Of significance at the meeting were the graphs that had been developed which showed V.C.C.'s student contact hourly cost as the lowest in the province. The notes of the MAC meeting will be released shortly.

all these are the things worth while in life.

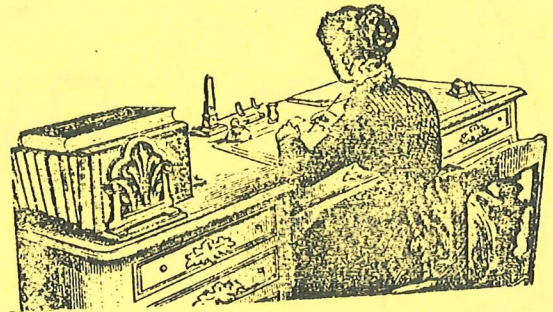

Raising money to help our cashier whose family back on the Island had been burned out of their home one winter night.



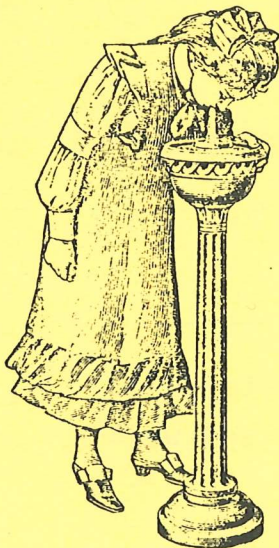

THE MORE THINGS CHANGE, THE MORE THEY REMAIN THE SAME

The following letter was a message to all VVI faculty by Dean Goard, Sr., first VVI Principal, and was written in 1949!

To All Instructional Staff:

SUBJECT: The Operation of Public Relations Factors in an Educational Program.

All organizations, business firms and institutions are engaged continuously in public relations activity. Unfortunately, some of them don't know it. Many others are aware of it only dimly. Comparatively few give it the thought, the planning and the effort which it requires and deserves.

Public relations might be defined as "the process by which an institution acquires and develops a personality, in the eyes of the public". This process is much more complex than is sometimes realized. Many factors are busily exerting their influence at one and the same time, and not always are these factors all pushing in the same direction.

It is the intent of this bulletin merely to present an incomplete but suggestive list of the public relations factors which are constantly at work in this, and similar, educational programs. Here are some of the readily recognized factors which contribute to the impression which others form of this school:

1. Our treatment of visitors, applicants and other guests.
2. Our methods of dealing with persons over the telephone, both at the switchboard and at the extensions.
3. The attitude of staff members themselves toward the school.
4. Our methods of dealing with students as individuals.
5. The quality and manner of instruction.
6. Characteristics and behavior of staff members.
7. Characteristics and behavior of students.
8. Official correspondence and literature, appearance and content.
9. The name of the school, insofar as it seems to define our activity.
10. The physical appearance of the school buildings, interior and exterior.
11. The content of the educational program offered.
12. Currently expressed opinions of present students.
13. Apparent educational achievement, and perhaps work performance, of former students.
14. Publicity -- press, radio, etc.
15. Any reputation inherited from the school's past performance.
16. Our methods of dealing with, and cooperating with, other community institutions, firms and agencies.

The list might be continued, but the factors mentioned above are more than sufficient to indicate the school-wide participation in the game of public relations. Each individual of the staff exerts an influence on the end result, and we each have almost complete control over the manner in which we exert that influence. It is by no means the purpose of this bulletin to suggest or prescribe a course of action for anyone; but it is hoped that one result will be an extended realization of how large a part is played by the individual staff member in the public relations program of the school. No one person can "control" any of the above factors. But which ones can one person influence? In answering that question, each of us identifies his own share of the total responsibility.
