




President Approval:

POLICY:

- A.1 Professional engagements, consulting and other forms of employment related to an employee's College responsibilities are desirable enhancements of employees' professional development. The College will approve such activities, subject to the conditions stated in this policy and other related policies.
- A.2 Employees of the College may not accept outside employment which will interfere with their College duty unless prior approval, in accordance with established procedures for requesting leave, is received in writing from the President or delegate.
- A.3 Where an employee engaged in an activity as described in A.1 and A.2 is in receipt of compensation, other than reimbursement for out-of-pocket expenses, from the external agency employing him, the employee's College salary shall be reduced by either the amount of such compensation or the amount of regular College salary, whichever is less, if the time committed is in conflict with College duty.

COUNSELLING NEWS FROM STRATHCONA

Films on Women in the Non-Traditional Trades

In the late eighties, the chief source of supply of labour would have to come from women entering or re-entering the labour market and from immigration (CEIC Task Force Report July 1981). As 'demand jobs' will be in the areas of 'micro-chips' and skilled technical areas, it was felt that immigrants, especially women, should thus be exposed to the concept of non-traditional occupations, which is not totally new in countries like Mainland China and Russia.

On Thursday, 11th March, two films were shown to students at lunch time. One entitled "Pretend You're Wearing a Barrel" showed a single parent mother of three returning to the work force as a welder working with ships. The second highlighted female participation in non-traditional jobs in the Alcan industry in Kitimat. The old counselling room was packed to capacity and students seemed to enjoy the exposure to possible occupational environment. An interesting comment from a male Asian student: "Asian women are too small in stature for these jobs."


Time did not allow the viewing of a video-tape entitled 'Yes, I can', which again focuses on what women can do in non-traditional areas like truck driving and in the machine industries. The job orientation classes were able to view it the next day.

Employment Orientation Sessions

A series of three lunch hour sessions on bi-lingual job search skills and employment orientation will be held on 23rd, 26th and 30th March in Room F. These sessions will be conducted by Elizabeth Lee and Alec Liu, who is a placement counsellor from Strathcona Manpower Outreach project. The sessions are limited to 15 male students. We welcome any referral from students with English level lower than B4.

This project is an attempt to meet the needs of students whose English level is not high enough to qualify for the job orientation classes.

A NEED FOR BABY CLOTHES



Two of our finest young musicians - violinist ANGELA CAVADAS and pianist MELINDA COFFEY - continue the VCC Music Department Faculty Recital Series, Sunday, March 21, 2:30 p.m., at 225 West 8th Avenue

Since her debut at the age of 9, ANGELA CAVADAS has won several of Canada's most prestigious awards, including the 1973 CBC National Talent Competition, the Vancouver Woman's Musical Club Competition and the Vancouver Symphony Scholarship. She has studied with such outstanding teachers as Steven Staryk and Joseph Gingold, and has appeared as soloist with the Vancouver Symphony, Saskatoon Symphony and Vancouver Philharmonic, for whom she has served as concert-mistress for several years, and is a member of the CBC Vancouver Orchestra and Vancouver Opera Orchestra. In addition to her numerous solo performances, she is a highly regarded teacher and member of the VCC music faculty.

MELINDA COFFEY received her B.A. from the University of California, and her Performer's Certificate from the renowned L'Institut des Hautes Etudes in Switzerland, and her M.A. from the University of B.C., where she studied with Robert Silverman. In recent years she has achieved an enviable reputation on the West Coast as a soloist and chamber music performer and as a teacher at the Vancouver Academy of Music.

Their program will present three well-contrasted violin-piano sonatas: Beethoven's Sonata No. 8, in G Major, Op. 30, No. 3, Prokofiev's Sonata No. 2, in D Major, Op. 94a, and Cesar Franck's Sonata in A Major.


