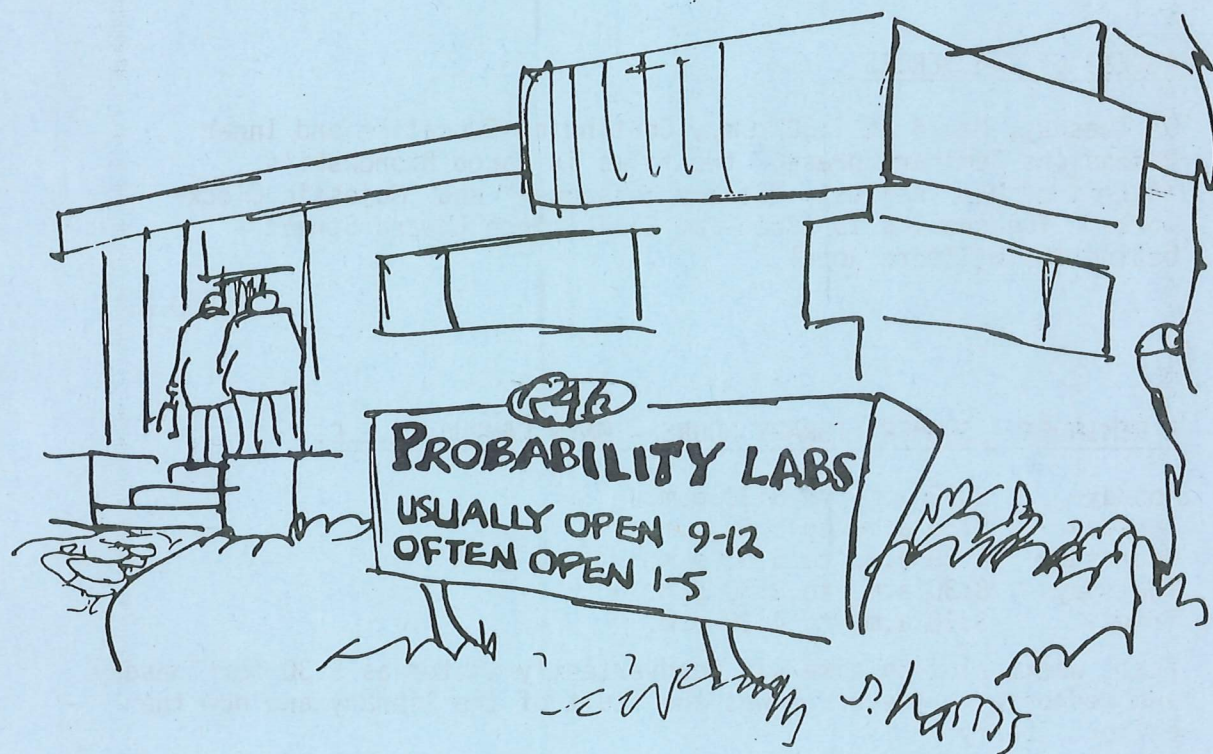

U.B.C. GRADUATE SEMINARS - SPRING SESSION 1982

May 3 - July 23: Term 1; May 3 - June 11;

Term 2; June 14 - July 23

English 508: Studies in the Structure of the English Language (1.5 units)

A. Kramer-Dahl: Speech and Writing as Linguistic and Literary Media - (Term 1)

This course investigates the nature and the interplay of the written and the oral, the visual and the acoustic modes of human symbolising. It deals with three large questions: (1) what are the fundamental semiotic differences between the two modes of symbolising; (2) what are the differences between literatures that depend entirely on the spoken word and those that depend on print; and (3) what will be the significance of the written word now that with the newer mass media a second orality has developed, one which both resembles and contracts with primary, pre-literate orality.

Assignments will include informal reports and a major paper.

English 505: Studies in Fiction (1.5 units)

E.-M. Kroller: Canadian Post-modernist Fiction in an International Context - (Term 2)

This course will attempt to situate representative Canadian post-modernist novels in an international context. Theories of post-modernist fiction will be discussed with constant reference to Findley's The Wars and Aquin's The Antiphony before expanding and modifying our results with the remainder of the reading list. Students will be encouraged to explore other relevant connections/ analogies/affinities between Canadian novels and international ones, both in class discussions and in their own work.

Students will be expected to write one major paper and one or two seminar papers. Please read Findley and Aquin before the course begins.

Reading list: Findley, The Wars (Penguin); Aquin, The Antiphony (Anansi); Hebert, Kamouraska (Paperjacks); Hodgins, The Invention of the World (Macmillan-NAL); Robbe-Grillet, The Voyeur (Grove); Grass, The Tin Drum (Random); Fowles, The French Lieutenant's Woman (NAL); Cortazar, Hopscotch (Avon).

Summer Session 1982

English 535: Studies in the Victorian Period (3 units)

J. Hulcoop: Key Victorian Poems

Lionel Stevenson has called Browning's Sordello the "key Victorian poem." This claim, though provocative, may be exaggerated. This seminar will begin by examining the validity of such a claim in relation to the major characteristics of Victorian poetry--for which reason, students taking this course will be expected to have taken an undergraduate course in Victorian poetry or to have read widely in this area on their own. The seminar will then consider a number of other poems which might also contend for the right to be called the "key Victorian poem": Maud, The Princess, In Memoriam, Idylls of the King (Tennyson); The Ring and the Book (Browning); Empedocles on Aetna (Matthew Arnold); Aurora Leigh (Elizabeth Barrett Browning).

Winter Session 1982-83

Full-time or part-time graduate students in full standing who wish to pre-register in these courses may do so by communicating directly with the instructors concerned. Other students must first secure the approval of the graduate advisor in English. Normally, to be eligible for enrolment, a student must have a high second or first-class degree from a recognized university or college and an appropriate background in literature.
