COLLEGE BOARD MEETING - MAY 12, 1982

After considerable discussion, the College Board passed a motion to endorse the 1982-83 budget allocation, the highlights of which are as follows:

- Gross budget: \$45.832 million
- KEC suggested allocation: \$ 9.894 million
- KEC overall increase: \$15.3%

The gross allocation from the Ministry of Education and Council was 44.331, leaving a balance of \$1.501 million to be made up from other sources. (Additional expenditures to be incurred by VCC which are not recognized in the allocation are the cost of increments and the cost of PD negotiated last year with the VIA, which are coming into effect this year.) These additional funds must come from sources such as tuition fees, shop and interest income, last year's surplus, etc.


The College Board will discuss proposed tuition fee increases at its next meeting (June 2, 1982), after which some modifications to the 82-83 expense plan may be necessary.

The Board approved the Program Objectives for KEC's Adult Special Education for the Visually Impaired Program.

The College Crest and Motto were approved.


