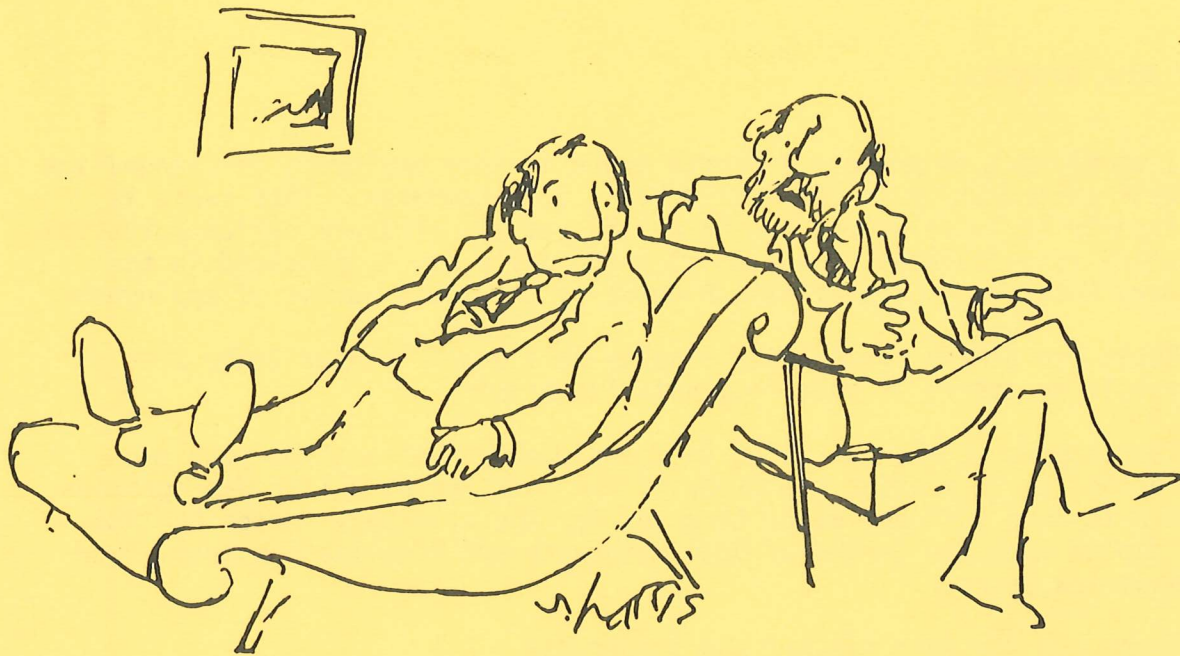

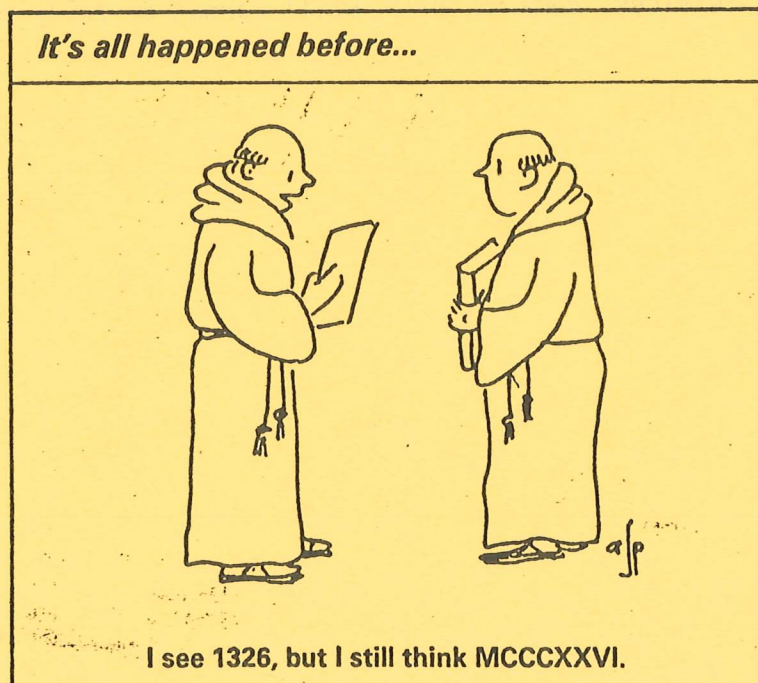

3. Notes from Ross Barbour (edited by F.F.)

In the spring I attended the Educ. 217 course at UBC - Basic Programming and Microcomputer Applications in Education. It was enjoyable but time-consuming. The highlight of the course was the availability of Apple IIs. They have "approximately 35" (can't they count?) and it is easy to get access to them after classes and on weekends. There is nothing like "hands on" learning! The instructor, Dr. Peter Braun, was approachable and patient, but the focus of his course was on teachers who will be teaching Data Processing in schools rather than on CAI.

The course is being given again in Summer School, but I wouldn't recommend you take it at that time if you are a novice. The more time you have on a terminal or micro, the more you will learn! Wait until fall. Other non-credit courses are also being given this summer (see above).

For those doing research or papers at UBC, there is a method of writing

text or data files onto floppy disks using an Apple and then transferring them to the mainframe system for analysis or for further text processing and printing on their wonderful printer.

For those of you who already own a micro and are thinking of adding peripherals, there is a small company in Richmond that rents hardware and software - all the way from game paddles to a completely configured IBM system including printer. It might be a good idea to spend a little extra \$ to see if the thing you are thinking of getting is really what you need. I rented a pair of game paddles and, although they were adequate, I think if I were to buy some, I would look for something more robust.

HEALTH SERVICES

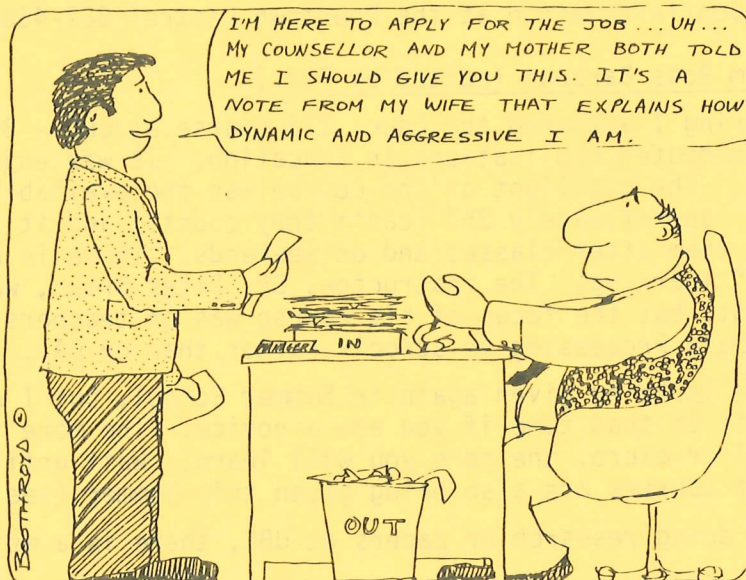
