For the first one, Ted Kirby, Grace Shaw and Diane Thompson were on the project advisory committee and Ted Kirby was one of the curriculum writers.


For the second, Barbara Little was one of the writers and Betty Pletcher was one of the reviewers.

Just one day's pay

Charities are caught in a squeeze by economic hard times.

The demand for services increases as growing numbers of people become, and stay, unemployed, and as economic hardship strains already fense family relationships.

But in these times it is harder than ever for social service agencies to keep up with growing needs. Economic downturns leave potential contributors unable or unwilling to part with their money.

2:As a consequence of last year's economic climate, the United Way fell \$300,000 short of its \$7.9 million goal. This year, times are even tougher. The goal has been set at \$8.6 million, reflecting the effects of inflation and increasing need.

The United Way is urging all employed people to donate a day's pay. Averaged out over a year, it works out to about \$1.50 a week for someone

earning \$20,000. Most people in that salary range wouldn't think twice before regularly spending \$1.50 on a beer or a package of cigarettes, but they flinch when asked, once a year, to donate \$78.

Divided among the 84 agencies, plus the Canadian Red Cross Society, that are funded by United Way, that weekly \$1.50 — or even the yearly \$78 — is little enough. But even that small amount from each donor adds up quickly and is of tremendous importance to each organization.

This year it is more important than ever that everyone make some contribution — a tiny one if necessary, but something — because hard times also mean that fewer really large donations are likely.

Even the hard pressed should not forget that there are people, right here in Vancouver, worse off than themselves.
