V.C.C. BOARD MEETING

The agenda of the College Board meeting of Wednesday, October 20th, included a number of items, several of which are discussed briefly below.

The College President's report to the Board was longer than usual and covered items ranging from fall term enrolment to lower mainland course/program rationalization to temporary funded course to King Edward's new campus, etc. (A copy of the report is on our library for your information.)

The Education and Student Services Committee of the Board brought to the Board's attention - and approval - motions dealing with;

- entry level training,

- goals and objectives,

- diploma in general education, and

- student access.

An item on the agenda dealt with financial aid for students. However, because the two ministers concerned (McGeer and Vander Zalm) have announced the release of funds for the "grant" portion of students' requests for loans/grants, the agenda item was not pursued.

During the private session of the Board, two noteworthy actions were taken.

1. The lowest tender on kitchen equipment for the new campus - from Russell Foods - was approved.

2. A proposal developed at this campus and pursued by our International Education Committee involving the completion of grades 11 and 12 by students from Hong Kong, all to be provided by the College on a fully cost-recoverable basis, was referred to the Education and Student Services Committee of the Board for study and recommendation respecting the propriety of the Board becoming involved in this form of educational activity and service.

ENGLISH PLACEMENT TEST


The next English Placement Test will be held on Tuesday, 1982 November 09 in the following rooms:






