

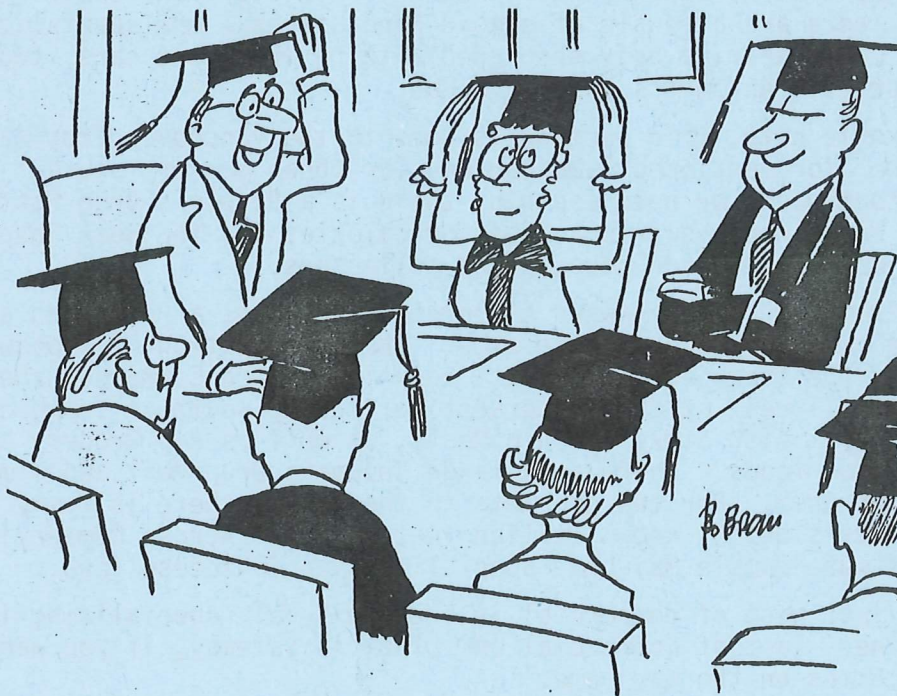

## NEW CAMPUS NEWS

### Structural Changes:

Some questions regarding structural changes to the building were asked following the recent site visit. No such changes will be effected prior to the move. After the move is fully complete, make your suggestions known to James Humble, K.E.C. Building Services Manager. Your request will require a convincing rationale and should be forwarded in writing indicating the approval of your department head.

### Parking:

Parking will be without charge at the new campus. By mid-May, a system of preferential parking for staff and instructors will be in place. Two lots will be set aside for their use, reserving one for students. At the present time and possibly until mid-May, tradesmen will require the use of the parking lot between the campus building and East 7th Avenue. Until mid-May, staff and instructors are asked to share the large lot north of E. 7th Ave. with students.

### The New Neighbourhood:

Near the new King Edward Campus facility you can fill up with Petro-Can, buy army surplus, dine Korean and take Jamaican groceries home for dinner.

Going west toward Fraser Street you'll find a couple of convenience stores, Alma's Food Store and Meat Market, Highland One Hour Dry Cleaning, the ubiquitous Mac's Milk, the Naturally Healthy Food Store and Sandwich Bar. In addition there are a couple of second hand stores - one specializing in recycled dance gear, a body shop specializing in import cars, two Italian eateries - Antonet's and Pizza Hut.

On a more exotic note, this section is home to the Vancouver Tropical Fish Store and the aforementioned Jamaican and Caribbean grocery store. If you run out of toothpaste or need aspirin, there is a People's Drug Mart. Anna's Cake House can answer cravings for calories and the Book Shack provides noontime browsing for second hand collectors.

Going east from the campus toward Commercial, there is a Petro-Can at Clark and the army surplus store at Woodlands. The intersection of Broadway and Commercial is the financial and retail heartland. The Commerce, the Scotia and the Royal all rest at this intersection. Going south on Commercial, there is Scotty's Fish Store and Rio Meats, as well as Rio Grocery specializing in Italian foods. There is a large Shoppers Drug Mart and Tim's Bakery and Tea Room. For the gourmets in the crowd, there is Tommy O's, one of the city's better known Italian restaurants. Across Commercial is the somewhat more humble Mai-Lim, specializing in Cantonese food.

On Broadway just west of Commercial is the New Seoul, specializing in Korean cuisine. East of Commercial one block is Safeway, if you want to pick up groceries on the way home.

North on Commercial at 7th Ave., is Patels Supermarket and the Vancouver East Cinema, offering a good selection of foreign and Hollywood films. In this vicinity too is a Motor Vehicles Branch and a postal station.

A word of caution - Fraser is about 3 blocks west of the new site and Commercial is about 5 blocks east.

### Getting There By Public Transit:

This is a most basic, thumbnail sketch of the ins and outs of getting to and from King Edward Campus by bus. Those who live nearby the proposed ALRT route will, within a few years, be whisked to the campus because there is to be a stop at the intersection of Broadway and Commercial.

In the meantime, for a good number of bus users, the #9 Broadway is a life line to and from our new campus. Services along this route appear to be first rate. The #9 begins at Broadway and Alma in the west and runs to the loop at Broadway and Boundary in the east. Through the core of the route, from Granville to Commercial, the buses run about every four minutes during rush hour. Through the rest of the route, throughout the day, buses run about every six minutes. From 6:00 p.m. to 10:30 p.m. they run from nine to twelve minutes apart. The run from Granville to Commercial takes about 16 minutes in rush hour traffic, while the trip from Boundary to Commercial takes about 10 minutes.

Important to those travelling to and from Burnaby, New West, Coquitlam, Port Moody and points east is the #9 shuttle service between Boundary loop and Brentwood. This runs every 15 minutes and links with #9 service along Broadway.

Another important route to and from the campus is #22. It runs north along Burrard, along Pender, over to Clark and south to intersect with Broadway. Running north, it leaves Southeast Marine Drive, travels along Knight onto Clark where it intersects with Broadway, right beside the campus. From downtown, running south along Clark and Knight, it is #22 Knight, running north along Knight to Clark then downtown it is #22 Macdonald. In fact, all the north/south routes in the city cross over Broadway, where a #9 to the new campus can be picked up. For those travelling along Kingsway, the #15 running north intersects with Knight, where they can pick up #22. This route running south on Kingsway becomes #19.

For those using east/west routes across the city, the buses along 49th, 41st and King Edward all intersect with Knight.

People living in White Rock, Delta, Ladner, Richmond or Tsawwassen take routes along Granville to Broadway, where they can pick up #9. As noted above, the run between Granville and Commercial takes about 16 minutes in rush hour traffic.

From the West End or from West Vancouver, commuters can pick up #20 on Granville to connect with a #9 Broadway. Coming from North Vancouver, those taking the Sea Bus could either take a #20 up Granville to Broadway and transfer to a #9, or walk up to Pender and take a #22 Knight that would take them over to Clark Drive and up to Broadway. Those taking buses over the Second Narrows would have to transfer at the Kootenay loop to a #27 Rupert, then transfer to a #9 at Broadway.

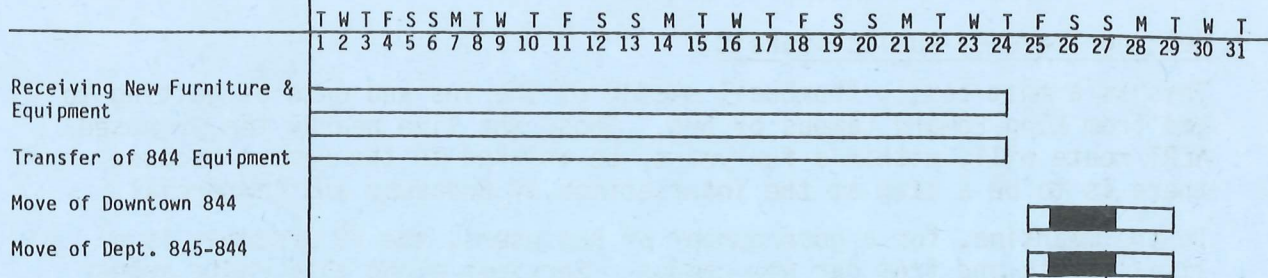
For those whose transit needs aren't met here, we suggest a call to Metro Transit Information at 324-3211. They will plot out a route for you.

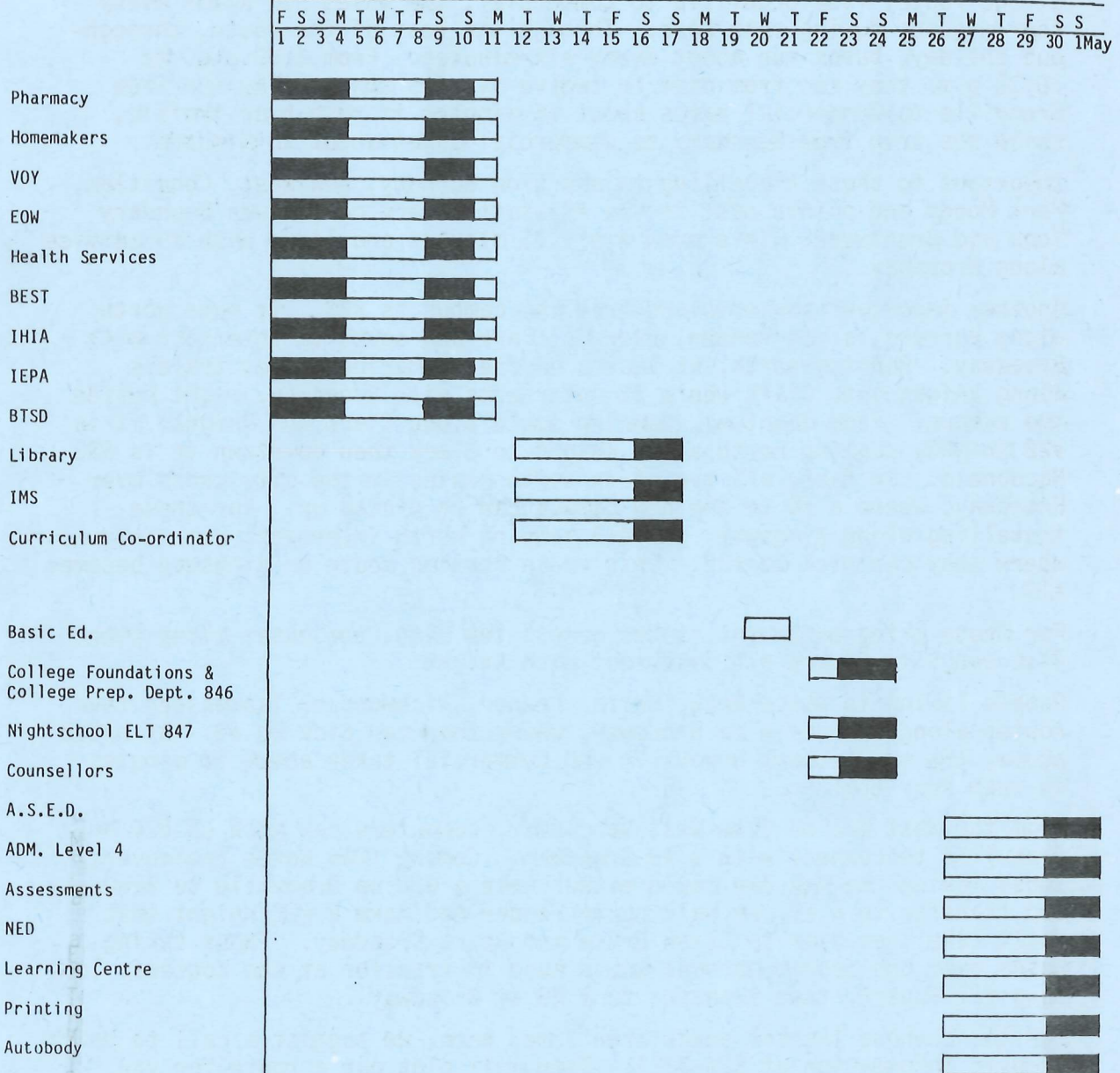

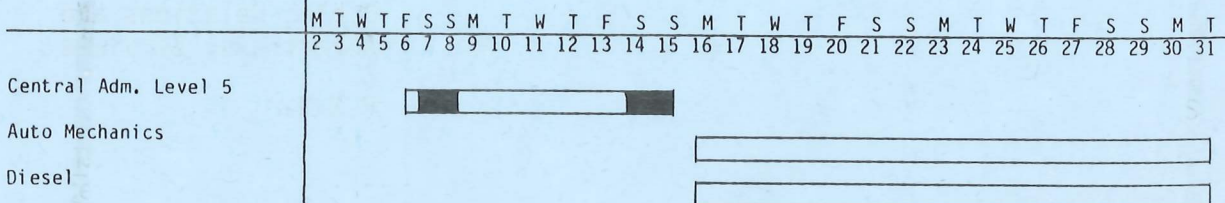

An information note for students, faculty, staff and administration:

The long awaited Counselling Orientation Program for students who want to take upgrading courses at V.C.C./K.E.C. is finally about to happen.

The program, which starts Wednesday, March 2nd at 6:00 p.m. is aimed at new or prospective students. A member of the Counselling Department will describe the many different ways a person can complete his/her education and will help individuals decide which is the best upgrading program for them.

Topics which will be included in the program are:

- preparing for college or university
- preparing for vocational school entrance
- finishing a high school program
- obtaining a special adult certificate
- selecting courses
- determining at which level to start
- scheduling classes

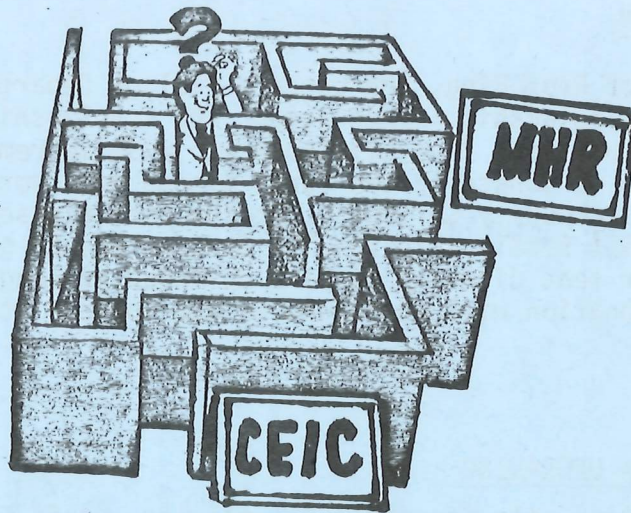
The program will be offered every Wednesday evening at 6:00 p.m. and every Thursday morning at 10:00 a.m. in Room 319. The orientation session is about one hour long, with additional time allowed for further discussion and individual questions.

The program is being offered in the hope that it will free up more time for the Counselling Department to provide individual and classroom sessions. The Department's new appointment schedule has been so successful that individual Counsellors are now often booked days in advance. New students and prospective students will still have the option of seeing Counsellors on an individual basis, but they will be encouraged to make use of the Orientation Program.
