# Chance to sing outdraws billing

They admit they couldn't have sold more than 50 tickets on their own. And that's why they need a draw like the Hi Lo's.

But the 17 singers of the Vancouver Community College jazz program know they're good enough to be on the Queen Elizabeth Theatre stage this Friday at 8 p.m. even if they aren't getting top billing.

And if you have any doubts about what the students can do, have they got something for you. It's a record they and the school's jazz band have just released on VCC's own label. It's available through the VCC music department in either disc or tape for \$9.

Vancouver Community College has one of the most practical music programs anywhere. If you have talent and you want to be a professional jazz or pop musician this is where

you go — not UBC.

Its music program is geared entirely to producing musicians capable of finding jobs in the industry. The teaching staff includes well-known musicians, executives from the recording industry and professionals who may not be household names, but who know how to grind out a livelihood from showbiz.

So it shouldn't be any great surprise that the musicians that come out of the two-year program are ready to jump into the professional arena.

The one difficulty, however, is in finding enough professional settings to give all of the students practical experience.

Thus, Friday's concert.

"We knew that if we were to give a concert at the Queen Elizabeth Theatre, we'd be lucky to draw 50 people," says Terry Smith, VCC Pro-

gram Assistant. So they went out and booked the Hi Lo's which the school's 17-member jazz choir will back up.

The Hi Lo's, you might remember, is a jazz vocal quartet that was organized in April, 1953, and became one of the most popular music groups of the time. They broke up in 1962 and made a comeback in 1978, recording an album with the Boss Brass.

Tickets for the Hi Lo's, backed by the VCC jazz choir — Soundwave '84 — are available at all VTC/CBO outlets.
