Subject: Instructional Organization of the Campus

Most instructors and support staff are aware that planning for re-organization has been underway for a considerable time. Dean Robert Cunningham has provided significant leadership in this undertaking, meeting with interested faculty members, department heads and division chairmen. In recent days, Mr. Cunningham and I have met with the President and Vice-President of the VIA to discuss the proposed change and the several options being considered.

The three divisions are planned to divide King Edward Campus into three natural sectors: English Language Training Division, Career Training Division and Adult Basic Education Division. The proposed organizational chart is shown on the following page.

The English Language Training Division will be the current Communication Arts Division without the Music Department. Otherwise, no changes are proposed. The Music Department will be transferred to the Career Training Division.

The Career Training Division will be comprised of programs which prepare students for direct employment. It will be the present Training and Development Division with the Music (as indicated above) and the Paraprofessional Worker for the Hearing Impaired and the Visually Impaired programs added and with the BJRT, BTSD, ASED and VOY programs moved into the Adult Basic Education Division, where they logically belong.

The Adult Basic Education Division will combine the present ASED, BJRT, BTSD and College Foundations programs. Because of tradition - short though it be - and complexity, the structure of this division has not been as straight forward as for the other two. The proposed departments are BTSD, College Foundations and Developmental Studies. Developmental Studies would encompass the ASED, BJRT and the Basic Education programs.

The attached chart denotes the proposed organization and the levels of responsibility. All newly created positions will have job descriptions prepared and posted.

At Monday's meeting of the KEC Management Committee, the following resolution was approved:


"That this Committee recommends that the proposed re-organization, dated 1984 January 30 be widely distributed to faculty, with a request that any desired input be forwarded to the Dean of Instruction or the appropriate division chairman, and that it be returned to the Management Committee for a final decision on 1984 February 20."

If you have any concerns or alternate suggestions regarding the re-structuring of our instructional programs, please address them to your division chairman or to the Dean of Instruction by Friday, February 17th. On Monday, February 20th the KEC Management Committee will make the decision on the organizational structure of the Campus, taking into consideration the concerns raised.

#### NEW FACES AND CHANGES IN THE COUNSELLING DEPARTMENT

There is absolutely no truth to the rumour that Counselling has hired two new counsellors with money donated by Mr. Vanderzalm but it is true we have two new counsellors on staff and that a third will be hired at the end of February.

Even though you may see Greta on campus almost every day she really is retired. She is on a post-retirement employment program and we shall therefore continue to have the benefit of her training and experience for 50 days a year for the next three years and 25 days a year for the subsequent two years. Her position called a program liaison counsellor for students with special needs and/or learning disabilities will hopefully be filled sometime in the next two weeks. Greta, in addition to her regular counselling duties, acted as liaison counsellor to Basic Education and I.E.P.A. Her replacement will continue to be the contact person in the same areas in addition to being a liaison counsellor for the special needs programs.

Another change in the Department is that we have finally been given an OK to fill Dianne Thompson's former position. It still leaves the Department down one half a counselling position but it does add a full time E.L.T. liaison counsellor to work with Ginger Chang who is on a half time term contract.

Our only problem in hiring the E.L.T. liaison counsellor was a pleasant one - we had too many qualified applicants. After many interviews and a lot of discussion the interview committee which was composed of Al Stusiak, Ginger Chang and myself selected Heather Luk Chan to be our new E.L.T. liaison counsellor. Heather has excellent professional qualifications and an extensive work experience in dealing with our student clientele both in the E.S.L. and other K.E.C. programs. In addition to her work with the Greater Vancouver Mental Health Services and Big Sisters, Heather managed to find the time to work as a volunteer with community programs aimed at E.S.L. students including acting as conference coordinator for the Indo-Chinese Refugee Symposium sponsored by the Department of Psychiatry at U.B.C.

Heather was born in Canton, attended Britannia High School, Langara and U.B.C. She has a Master's Degree of Arts in Psychology and has a B.C. Teaching Certificate. She has also taken the basic "T.E.S.L." program offered by the University of Alberta. With Heather on staff we are looking to expand our services to the E.L.T. programs.

The last change in the Department was necessitated by a lightening raid by the Math Department under the leadership of Elizabeth Macleod which resulted in Frank Fornelli being spirited away for a one year placement to teach computer literacy. Although Frank is already being missed we were fortunate to be able to hire an equally qualified replacement - Loren Houldson.

Loren has a Master's Degree of Arts in Counselling Psychology, a Master's Degree of Arts in English and B.A. (Honours Classic). He has worked in a wide variety of skilled and unskilled jobs, taught school and counselled at both the High School and the University level. In addition to his strong academic qualifications, Loren has counselling experience in working with people who are unemployed, disadvantaged and/or involved with the various agencies. Loren will be on staff until December 21, 1984 and will take on Frank's teaching and career counselling responsibilities in addition to his general counselling duties.

If you have a chance, drop by and meet Loren and Heather.

#### CHOICES IS BACK

Thanks to a generous contribution of \$1,500 by the K.E.C. Student Council CHOICES is back with us again! Please pass the following information on to your students:

#### WHAT IS IT?

CHOICES is a system of computer stored information on 300 occupational clusters or job families.

You interact with an Apple II Micro-computer to sort through the information.

There is a student guide and worksheet that describes the types of information available and allows you to record your likes and dislikes prior to sitting down at the terminal.

#### WHO MAY USE IT?

Any student currently enrolled in any program or course at King Edward Campus.

#### WHAT DOES IT COST?

There is a materials cost of \$3.50.

You must be willing to spend several hours doing the necessary reading, thinking, and discussing.

#### WILL IT TELL ME WHAT JOB IS BEST FOR ME?

Absolutely not.

CHOICES is not magical nor all knowing.

#### SO - WHY WOULD I WANT TO USE IT?

CHOICES challenges you to think seriously about what you want in an occupation.

It provides a focus for your career planning discussions with a counsellor by giving you a detailed print-out of your career concerns.

It suggests types of occupations which you may want to explore in more detail through audio, audio/visual and printed material in the Counselling Career Centre.

It contributes the excitement of using computers to the hard task of career decision-making.

#### HOW DO I GO ABOUT USING CHOICES?

Make an appointment through the Counselling Department receptionist in Room 3002 to discuss career planning with a counsellor.

If after the initial counselling session, you and the counsellor feel that CHOICES could be helpful, you will be asked to purchase a CHOICES Guide and Profile (worksheet) available through the campus bookstore. This material will be yours to keep after completing the program. At this time, you may also make an appointment for a session with the computer.

Having read and completed the Guide and Profile at home, you will enter this information into the computer and receive a printed record of your interaction.

After looking over the printout at your leisure, you will return to your counsellor to discuss it and make further career exploration plans.

#### CHOICES

is merely ONE of the MANY tools counsellors use to aid you in the process of career development. Other tools include:

Interest testing,


Careers B.C. & Careers Canada Booklets
