TRAC (COMMON CORE) COMES TO KING EDWARD CAMPUS

On Monday, April 16th, after months of planning and preparation, a new to VCC program starts at King Edward Campus. TRAC is an acronym for TRaining ACcess. As such, it is an individualized, competency-based training program providing the first step in trades training.

To enter the program, students must be 18 years or older, or out of school for at least a year. Grade 10 or its equivalent is required and assessments in English and Mathematics may be required.

The program, for the time being, is part of the jurisdiction of the Vocation Preparation and Work Readiness Department. Howard Turpin, the Department Head, has been responsible for the developmental work to date. In this, he has been assisted by Jean Cranstoun, curriculum consultant and Peter Hamilton, VOY instructor. Bill Dalling, previously at VVI, joins the team as an instructor as does Ted Anderson, who also works with the VOY program.

Class registration will be built to forty and that number will be maintained.

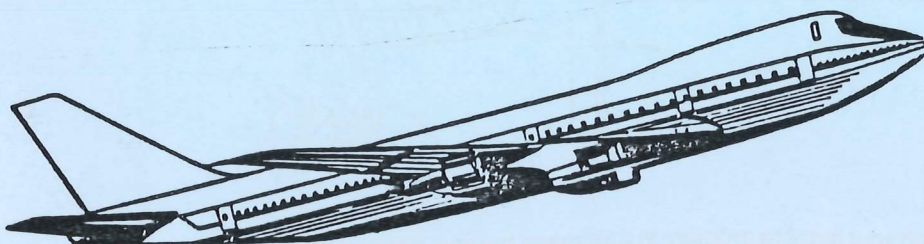

ON VACATION

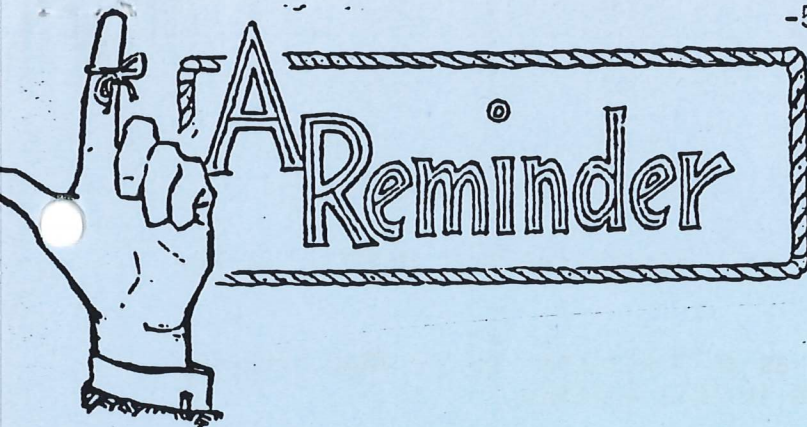

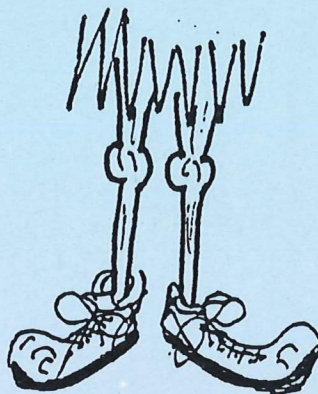
FROM THE RUNNING CORNER

For those not in the know, the Labbatt's 24 Hr. Relay is a relay race at Swangard Stadium, involving teams from all over the lower Mainland. It starts at 10:00 a.m. Saturday, and finishes at 10:00 a.m. Sunday. Teams of up to 20 runners run in relay fashion (3 miles per leg), accumulating as much mileage as possible. The event is organized to raise funds for the B.C. Society for Crippled Children. Money is raised through mileage pledges obtained by team members for their respective teams. Last year we had two teams entered; one a corporate team made up of VCC runners, and one a recreational team composed of VCC and other runners. This year we would like to enter two teams again, and a meeting of interested participants will be held on Thursday, April 26 at 7:00 p.m. in the KEC Cafeteria, Room 2145.
