Dr. Richard Mott Pearce, newly appointed director of Continuing Education.

Dr. Richard Mott Pearce, 48, former director of the David Thompson University Centre in Nelson, has been appointed director of Continuing Education for Vancouver Community College. Dr. Pearce, who has more than 20 years experience as a teacher and educational administrator, was previously a teacher and administrator at the University of Victoria, Simon Fraser University's faculty of education and Skagit Valley Community College. He taught high school biology in the Vancouver school system for three years. The new CE director received his Ph.D. and M.S. from the University of Oregon and his B.A. from UBC. "Throughout my career I've had a particular interest in adult education, in working with people in the community to meet their education needs," he said in a recent interview from Nelson.

The week of May 28 Vancouver Community College President Tony Manera acts as host to more than 800 instructors and administrators from across Canada at the joint conference of the Association of Canadian Community Colleges and the Canadian Vocational Association. The three day conference is built around the theme "The Future is Now!" The keynote address by Ontario's Deputy Minister for Citizenship and Culture, Bernard Ostry, looks at the question: What Kinds of Futures? Sessions will examine learning resources for the future, instructors and trainers in the future, and the workplace in the year 2000.



David Parnell, a blind student in Vancouver Vocational Institute's clerk typist program, was awarded a \$300 bursary from the International Order of the Daughters of the Empire last week. David, who hopes to get a job as a draft dicta typist when he graduates in August, masters his studies in dicta typing and business communications through the use of audio tapes and a brailler to take notes. IODE representatives Marilee Pollack and Shirley Iaci commended David for his courage and perseverence.

Vancouver Community College is offering a new service to the public through its speakers bureau. The bureau draws on the experience and enthusiasm of people throughout the college to provide speakers, at no charge, to groups in the community. We have experts on literally hundreds of subjects — from world affairs and child development, to vegetarian cooking and stress reduction. Students from Langara Campus's arts-in-merchandising program put their talents to work recently for the non-profit S.S. master Society. This group of dedicated seafarers is working to restore the S.S. Master, the last steam tug to work the west coast waters. The work is costly and members solicit funds from heritage organizations and businesses. To give the project a more striking image, the society executive invited the program's 27 second year students to submit a design package, using a logo on stationary, envelopes, tee shirts and brochures. The winning entry came from Karen Kalenda.

Vancouver Vocational Institute's drafting department recently received a substantial gift from B.C. Forest Products and H.A. Simons International Ltd. in the form of a scale model of the forestry company's #3 paper machine at Crofton. The complex model, built on a scale of 3/8 inch to one foot, measures 15 feet by five and a half feet by four feet and takes up most of a room. The model took nearly 800,000 man-hours to build and is valued at between \$500,000 and \$600,000. It is an invaluable instructional aid to drafting students who will have a direct visual correlative for their working drawings.

May 2 the mall at Vancouver Vocational Institute was the scene of a lively look at work, poetry and music. The National Book Festival event, sponsored by the Vancouver Vocational Institute library, combined the talents of poets Kirsten Emmott, Phil Hall and Tom Wayman, as well as songster Tom Hawken. They took a lively, sometimes humourous, sometimes sad look at work, that ranged from the labour of giving birth to the toil of working on oil rigs.

Renowned American educator, Dr. John Roueche, talked to instructors and administrators from colleges and institutes throughout the Lower Mainland in a presentation at King Edward Campus May 4. The professor of education at the University of Texas told the audience of instructors and administrators that community colleges had to ensure that they maintained structures and content in their operations, but these should not come at the cost of a humane, caring system of education.

CUTBACKS IN JANITORIAL SERVICES

As a consequence of the reduced 1984-85 budget, it has become necessary to cut back on the campus janitorial services. The following adjustments take effect immediately:

- 1. No reduction of services in Washrooms.
- 2. Automotive, Autobody and Diesel Shops to be swept once per week degreasing on request at extra cost.
- 3. Classrooms dust wiped or vacuumed three days per week blackboards weekly, garbage collected daily.
- 4. Offices vacuumed or dust mopped three days per week, garbage collected daily.
- 5. Library vacuumed three days per week.
- 6. Hallways swept nightly, damp wiped two days per week.

With the co-operation of staff, faculty and students, it is hoped that the effects of the reduced services will be minimal. To this end faculty, staff and students who eat in the cafeteria are asked not to take plates, cups or cutlery from the dining area. After eating, please place trays and dishes on the racks provided. Bag lunches must not be eaten in the classrooms. Please use the cafeteria or the outdoor plazas. Thank you.
