UNITED WAY

For the past several years, King Edward Campus - its faculty, staff, students and administrators - have supported generously the United Way Campaign and that support has been appreciated.

This year's campaign is now underway and, while there are many organizations - each undoubtedly representing a worthwhile cause - which appeal to us for funds, the United Way does represent 84 separate agencies and all of us are asked to contribute to this year's united effort on behalf of our community. Last year, KEC raised \$7,784.00 with 60 charitable receipts being issued. (Some will have participated in the Rainbow Sale, the 24-Hour Run, etc. and not necessarily have been receipted). All contributions, of course, helped to raise the \$7,784.00.

Dean Robert Cunningham's secretary, Mrs. Myrna Redman, is this year's United Way Coordinator for KEC. She has recommended - and we agree - that this year's goal should be \$6,300.00. It's a bit of a drop from last year, but understandably so because of the support we're giving (almost simultaneously) to the VCC Educational Foundation fund-raising drive.

The number of people who gave last year - 60 - is noteworthy, from two points of view: it's praiseworthy that so few gave so much and secondly, that with an employee group of approximately 400, only about 15% contributed.

The United Way has, for a number of years, called for contributions based on a day's pay. Some people do just that. Others find that that is simply too much and, rather than a day's pay, they give nothing. And that's unfortunate.

For this year, we want to stress involvement. Can you afford a couple of dollars a month (by using the payroll deduction plan)? A dollar a month? A one-time gift of \$20.00? Or \$10.00? Or \$5.00? If yes, why not contribute? It's involvement we want to encourage.


But there's more. A number of fund-raising activities are being planned and again, we invite you to participate and to become involved.



OUR ANNUAL SPORTS SPECTACULAR IN SUPPORT OF
THE 1984 UNITED WAY CAMPAIGN

On Thursday, October 25 at 12:30 p.m. the United Way and the V.C.C. No Name Running Club will officially start the second annual "V.C.C. 24-Hour United Way Relay" in support of the Vancouver Community College United Way fund drive.

For 24 hours through rain or shine and the dark of night, heroic V.C.C. runners representing administrators, faculty, staff and students will be circling the track at China Creek Park (opposite the student parking lot at K.E.C. Campus).

For the Relay to be successful in raising \$ for the United Way and in getting good P.R. for the College, we need your support.

First, we need runners - people who are prepared to commit from fifteen minutes to one hour of their day to put one foot in front of the other and find their way around a circular track; people who are punctual, are not afraid of the dark and who are prepared to get wet. If you are foolish enough to still want to run, place your name on the runners' list that will be posted in the faculty/staff lounge on Tuesday, October 16.

Second, we need your financial support. Hopefully the runners will be able to complete a total of 200 miles. What we want to do is to challenge the various departments or work groups and campus areas to compete in raising running pledges of "X" \$ per mile. Somebody in your department or work group will be contacting you for your support. Please help if you can. A pledge of 1¢ per mile would only cost you \$2.00 if the "Team" is able to break the 200 mile barrier.

Third, we need a "pit crew" of supporters to back up the runners. People who are willing to help keep track of laps, help prepare the track, etc. If you can help out, place your name on the volunteer list, also posted in the faculty/staff lounge. We will have the use of a mobile home to work out of and there will be provisions made to access facilities on Campus during the 24 hour period.

Fourth, we need your moral and physical support. We need a cheering crowd at 12:30 p.m. on Thursday to help send off the first runner and people to drop by the track to give the runners a little vocal encouragement.

Finally, be there at 12:30 p.m. Friday, October 26th to cheer the last runners when they cross the finish line (hopefully breaking through the "200 mile barrier"). Watch for a list of supporting events in the next issue of the Times.

Security Personnel can be contacted in several ways:

1. Dial Local 204 - or
2. Until 5:00 p.m. dial the console (0) and ask the operator to contact security via the two-way radio.
3. After 5:00 p.m. Monday to Thursday dial the Counselling switchboard at local 208 and ask the operator to contact security via the two-way radio.
4. After 7:30 p.m. Monday to Thursday dial the Continuing Education switchboard at local 200 and ask the operator to contact security via the two-way radio.
5. After 5:00 p.m. Friday dial the Administration on duty at local 723 and ask that security be contacted via the two-way radio.
6. After 5:00 p.m. dial the voice pager, number 667-2638. Announce your concise message into the phone. It will be recorded and, after you hang up, it will be transmitted to security. If you are calling from on-campus, remember to dial 9 first and then the pager number.

After hours access to the building.

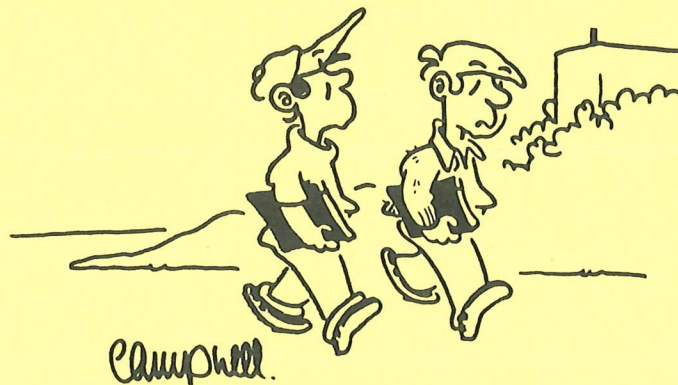

- *9. Low comprehension of language (receptive and/or expressive)
- *10. Discrimination difficulties - often mistakes what you say or what is read for something else
- *11. History of "not making it" in school
- *12. Seems to understand what is said in class but has difficulty understanding reading material
- *13. Extreme difficulty with written expression, e.g. syntax or organizing thoughts

In addition to penalty action against companies, prosecution of individuals will be considered where there appears to be a deliberate disregard for safety.

VCC EDUCATIONAL FOUNDATION

The Board of Directors of the VCC Educational Foundation has issued a challenge to the Vancouver Foundation to match dollar-for-dollar the VCC Educational Foundation Endowment Fund totalling \$125,000 if a minimum of that amount is deposited by 1985 September 30.

Additionally, the Board has issued further challenges, also for dollar-for-dollar matching, for the two subsequent years: for 1986 September 30, another \$100,000; and for 1987 September 30, also \$100,000.

College personnel are also challenged; those at KEC are challenged to raise approximately \$7,000 and Jim Humble - with the planning, participation and involvement of quite a few of our number - is giving leadership in meeting our goal. You can help. How? By buying a lottery ticket - or two, or three, or ... - for a free trip for two to Mexico (with other valuable second and third prizes); or, of course, by making a direct contribution (an income tax receipt will be issued) to the Foundation. 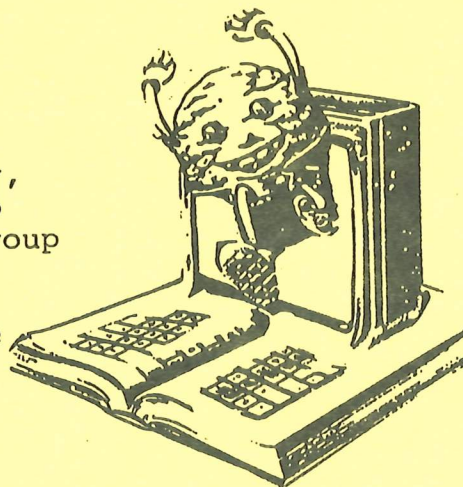

BOUQUET OF THE WEEK

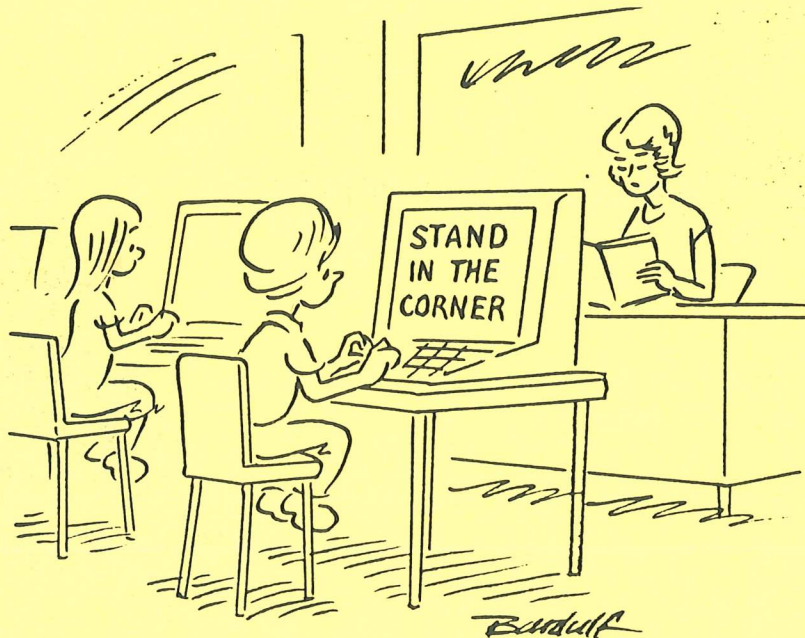
A large bunch of forget-me-nots to Jim Humble and Sar Mann for their work on behalf of the Vancouver Community College Foundation on our campus.
