NOTICE TO ALL FACULTY AND-STAFF RE: ABESAP

To date we have still not received confirmation from the Ministry of Education regarding the amount of our 85/86 ABESAP grant. We have, however, been given verbal indication that we can expect a similar allocation to last year's grant (\$32,448).

Since January of 1984, the demand for ABESAP assistance has risen dramatically due to increased tuition fees, living costs, and cuts to the Ministry of Human Resources' educational funding.

Our total expenditure at K.E.C. for the ABESAP program year, May 1, 1984 to April 30, 1985, was in excess of \$78,000. This sum was made up of the following:

- retained surplus from 83/84 (total grant 83/84 = \$90,000)	\$25,460
- 84/85 allocation from Ministry of Education	32,400
- Special Assistance funds converted to ABESAP upon termination of Special Assistance Program	3,800
- additional grant from Ministry of Education	6,000
- donation from Student Advisory Committee	11,000
	\$78,660

Despite very stringent application and assessment procedures, we were not able to address the needs of students enrolling in programs that began in February, March, and April. In order to meet the real financial needs of King Edward Campus students, we require an annual grant in the range of \$100,000 to \$115,000.

The Campus Administration will continue to solicit all sources of additional funds in order to supplement the ABESAP allocation. In the meantime, we have decided to maintain the existing policy and procedures regarding application. They are as follows:

- assistance will be directed solely towards the cost of tuition fees. (ie. students whose fees are paid by MHR or Manpower will not be eligible to apply.)
- applicants who are being supported by any agency (such as MHR) must first seek tuition fee assistance from that agency; if such assistance is denied, the applicant must provide a written statement to that effect from the agency.
- applicants who are dependent upon a family member or other sponsor must be able to provide the appropriate income information of the sponsor.
- applicants who are new to King Edward Campus must have attended classes for at least 2 weeks before applying for ABESAP assistance in order to provide instructor's comments on the application.

In addition to the above, we will accept applications <u>only</u> for programs or courses that begin <u>AFTER May 1, 1985</u>. We are aware that there are many students, particularly in English Language Training, who registered in March and are hoping to recoup some of the cost of fees from ABESAP. All students who have inquired at this office since January, were advised that if they chose to register they did so at their own risk. We have made it clear that we did not know what would be available for the coming year. While we are aware of the hardship this may create in some situations, this is unavoidable given the dollars available.

Applications will be processed on a first-come, first-serve basis until the money runs out. Any changes to the above will be announced through the King Edward Times as soon as they are known.

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

Bev was the supervisor for printing and duplicating at Langara and will be continuing with the same duties under the re-structuring of VCC duplicating.




