COLLEGE BOARD MEETING

The College Board met Wednesday, April 24th, for its regular monthly meeting. Board Chairman Mrs. E. Jarvis announced the resignation of College Board member Mrs. Virginia Giles and the appointment of two new Board members, Anthony Saunders and Mrs. Hope Wotherspoon.

The President's Report to the Board touched on the following items of interest:

Messrs. J. Pearkes and J. Chapman reported respecting the VCC Educational Foundation and the BCAC respectively.

Dr. Chapman also reported on behalf of the Education and Student Services Committee; the recommendations made by that Committee (and recorded on pages 9 and 10 of the agenda material) were approved by the Board.

The Board approved phase two of the Metro Vancouver Youth Job Corps contract in the amount of \$350,000. The program is offered under the aegis of Continuing Education. Also approved were temporary funded courses for the Basic Food Service Worker program (CE) and the Dental Technician/Mechanic program (VVI).

The Board approved the distribution of the 1% additional funding received from the Ministry (\$381,000) as follows:

In addition, Dr. Denholm informed the Board of additional funds available: \$152,000 for operating capital (not yet distributed), \$545,000 for institutional renewal (not yet distributed), and \$5,800,000 for the college system for local economic renewal and development (accessed by application).

In private session, the Board approved a contract for the installation of a new telephone system for Langara Campus, utilizing the funds specifically allocated by the Ministry for that purpose.

A copy of the Board agenda with back-up material, the minutes of the previous meeting, and the President's Report to the Board have been placed in the KEC Library for the information of those interested.

Last week Vancouver Community College's spring and summer flyer, detailing more than 600 part-time courses, was dropped in every Vancouver mail box. If, by any chance, you didn't receive your copy, you can pick one up at the nearest community centre, library, or VCC campus. VCC offers top quality programs, that range from business and the trades, to travel, music, art and writing. Do your mind a favour. Look through the VCC spring and summer flyer! Courses are competatively priced. You can pay by cash, cheque or Visa.

Vancouver Community College recently named its top women's and men's athletes for 1984-85. Taking the honours for the women were Langara Campus basketball stars Sue Macpherson and Leah Ellis. MacPherson was named to the all-Canada team at the women's national championships, held in Saskatchewan at the end of March. This ranks her as one of the top ten women players in Canada. Leah Ellis was named to the all-star team at the championships. Their team lost the national championship by one point in overtime. Top ranked VCC men were Langara Campus basket ball stars Marty Lutz and Jay Derksen. Lutz was named to the all-Canada team at the Saskatchewan national championships, while Derksen was named to the all-star team at the championships. The men's team placed fourth at the nationals.

Last week Vancouver Mayor Mike Harcourt spoke at Langara Campus, concluding lecture series "Canada's Neighbours in Asia." This series, which began in September, has featured guest speakers from throughout the Pacific Rim. It was jointly sponsored by Vancouver Community College's Pacific Rim Program and by the Canadian International Development Agency.

Congratulations to instructors and students in the food trades program at the college's Vancouver Vocational Institute. They took a number of silver and bronze medals at the B.C. Chefs' Association Culinary Arts Show, held recently in Robson Square Media Centre.

In March Vancouver Community College took part in an educational fair in Hong Kong, along with 31 other institutions from Canada, the U.S., Switzerland, England and Australia. The college's director of International Education, Norm Henderson, reported more than 16,000 visitors attended the three day fair. This fall, for the first time, the college will open its doors to about 50 overseas students from Hong Kong, who will take high school completion through the College Foundations division of King Edward Campus. In addition, overseas students can now compete for positions in other college programs. All programs for foreign students are offered on a cost-recovery basis. That is, there is no government subsidy to offset the tuition paid by the individual.

Career Awareness is a program run by Continuing Education, that combines lifeskills and job experience for mentally handicapped adults. At a recent graduation ceremony for 16 participants, Norman Gould of the Vancouver Kiwanis Club presented the program with two micro-computers. These will by used by students in the program to upgrade their basic literacy and numeric skills.

Brian Dwyer, of Vancouver Vocational Institute's program development department, left March 29 to undertake a special contract, through the Canadian International Development Agency, with International Rail Consultants. He will act as an educational consultant for railway manpower training systems in Tanzania and Kenya.

King Edward Campus's diesel mechanics program is continuing VCC's tradition of cooperation with business and industry. The department recently began a pilot service skills training program for Finning Tractor and Equipment, that will provide the company's apprentices with an intensive two week course on Caterpillar equipment. The program was designed in cooperation with Finning is training division.

Vancouver Vocational Institute's hairdressing department is offering new programs in electrolysis and skin care, beginning in May. For clients at VVI salon, located on the campus at 250 West Pender St., this means a whole new regime of services is available, among them silk and artificial nails, cellulite treatments, aromatherapy and hair removal. All work is done by students under the supervision of instructors with many years of experience. For more information call the hairdressing department at 681-8111.


