COFFEE AT 3 ON THURSDAY, THE 9TH



Bruce Clausen will be leaving us at the end of this term, and will be moving to Ottawa.

He is a classical scholar (Greek and Latin) who opted for a musical life both as a guitar player and as a teacher. He is fluent both as a performer and as a teacher in nearly all areas of music. He is well known as a classical guitar recitalist and soloist, and is equally in demand in the studios or as a jazz guitarist.

Since 1974, Bruce has been the mainstay and anchor of the Jazz and Commercial Program, simultaneously teaching our classical guitar students. His impeccable musical taste and knowledge of many styles of music have been transmitted to his students, many of whom are now professional performers. In the classroom, he has a style of teaching which is both logical and clear, and which reflects his love for, and knowledge of, the subject matter.

The highly successful concept of the Performance Techniques class was initiated by Bruce, and he has been a member of, or has chaired, faculty committees each year throughout his tenure as a faculty member. His abilities are such that I could not envision replacing him with a single individual. I have little double that he will find a varied, rewarding musical life in Ottawa, but his departure will leave a large void in our Department.

He has been a wonderful teacher, performer and scholar, dedicated to his students, and loyal to the College.

He is respected and liked by his colleagues and has had the admiration and gratitude of many students over the last eleven years. We all will miss him greatly.

A.B.E. ARTICULATION (April 17, 1985)

I am writing to thank you for your participation on the A.B.E. Articulation Development Committee and to congratulate you and your colleagues for successfully developing a workable framework.

You will be interested to know that we in the Ministry of Education are moving quickly to implement the recommendations contained in the Report on A.B.E. Articulation. Specifically, we are, or soon will be:

- 1. Striking an articulation committee for a late May or early June meeting to begin the more detailed work within the recommended framework (Recommendation 6).
- 2. Writing to all college and institute principals to encourage an early adoption of the new framework (Recommendation 1 and 3).
- 3. Developing a prototype "A.B.E. Provincial Certificate" (Recommendation 4).
- 4. Developing a brochure describing the Adult Basic Education options available in this province (Recommendation 5).
- 5. Revising the Post-Secondary Discipline Classification to reflect the new framework and when this is accomplished will refer the issue of program weights to the appropriate committee (Recommendation 2).

NEW DUPLICATING STRUCTURE

As endorsed by C.E.C. the College duplicating facilities have been re-structured. Effective April 1, 1985 these areas became the budget and organizational responsibilities of the Purchasing Manager.

A centralized facility located on level 'R' at K.E.C. is being arranged to provide services to K.E.C., V.V.I. and Central Administration. A satellite operation is being organized at Langara. Bev Nichols has been transferred and is now working at the K.E.C. location. She will supervise both operations and reports to the Purchasing Manager.

K.E.C. DUPLICATING

There will only be a few minor changes to the current method that K.E.C. utilizes.

- i.e. All K.E.C. duplicating requests will still flow through Dorothy Moutter's Department and must have her or her delegates approval prior to being actioned.
 - A new location for pick-up of finished goods is being organized. (App. 50' from existing area)
 - The 'spirit duplicator' will be relocated to the new finished goods area.
 - Access to the finished goods area will be available as you require.
 - A new form endorsed by K.E.C. will be introduced.

I hope this information will be of some assistance in calming any fears you may have had with the current activity in the duplicating room. As this re-organization evolves, I will attempt to keep you all informed. At this time, please allow me to express my thanks for your patience, understanding and co-operation.


