KEC ENDOWMENT FUND CAMPAIGN

You may recollect that an announcement was made last spring that VCC's second \$100,000 challenge for equal matching by the Vancouver Foundation had been met by June 30th. The funds were immediately placed into the endowment fund, were matched dollar-for-dollar by the Vancouver Foundation, and the total is earning investment income for the College.

The third challenge - also to raise \$100,000 - got underway immediately and the College has until March 31st of next year to achieve that goal. If we raise it by March 31st - and I think we will - the total will also be matched with an equal amount by the Vancouver Foundation.

The College community has been challenged to support this fund-raising effort and each of the College's instructional divisions is approaching its drive for the internal campaign in its own way. The VCC Educational Foundation board of directors is carrying the campaign for funds into the community and its corporate board rooms and offices.

The KEC internal campaign committee has not set a specific target for the current campaign; however, I can report on several very interesting developments.

First, Mr. Howard Carter has donated a 1975 Mustang which students, faculty and staff from the Auto Body Repair and Auto Mechanics programs are restoring to like-new condition. When the work is done, the car will be raffled and, while the ticket price hasn't been determined, I know it will be reasonable. I hope that many students, faculty and staff will want to buy tickets. Langara's Marketing and Sales students, with instructor Keith Murray, will be overseeing publicity and ticket sales. The kick-off day will be near the first of December. More on this later.

Second, KEC's internal endowment fund campaign committee has agreed to "buy" an evening of "Ain't Misbehavin'" at the Arts Club Revue Theatre. Miriam Bennett and a small committee are putting this together and I expect that "our evening" will be sometime in October - probably the latter part. More details on this within the next week or so. But, in the meantime, you can put in your order with Miriam now for a rib-ticklin', fun-filled evening. (And you'll even get a receipt for income tax purposes for part of the cost for admission.)

Third, the internal committee endorsed an idea Jim Humble proposed which calls for a fashion show starring B.C. Lions cheerleaders and football players and features the KEC Music Department, the VVI Food Trades and possibly others as well. The suggested venue is the spacious concourse at VVI off Dunsmuir and Hamilton. But, again, more details later.

For the current campaign, the following contributions have already been made:

- at its last meeting, the executive of the King Edward Student Association approved a motion whereby the remaining funds of the Association (\$3,680.45) were donated to the VCC Endowment Fund;
- for the period August to December next, the Italian Cultural Centre will have made six contributions to the Fund of \$250 each (\$1,500);
- a member of the KEC family has made a donation of \$1,000.

Thus, \$6,180.45 has already been gathered. All of the funds are earmarked for the endowment fund for financial aid for KEC students.

While the internal campaign committee has agreed not to approach VCC employees at this campus, either individually or collectively, for donations, some may wish to contribute nonetheless; they should direct their contributions to me (as internal campaign committee chairman). Of course, contributions may be made by payroll deduction(s).

An idea that has surfaced several times - and I really don't know its origin - is that some instructors may wish "to substitute" for a colleague and donate the wages for the time of substitution to the VCC Educational Endowment Fund. Shirley Girvan has checked with our payrolls office and Jim Ho confirms that the wages for substitute work can be so designated. Instructors should note that income tax receipts will not be issued but the College will transfer to the endowment fund the wages for the time of substitution plus the cost of fringe benefits that apply. If the instructor wishes a receipt, payment will be made to the instructor and the instructor then contributes the amount received for substituting. The contribution made to the endownment fund will obviously not be as large if this latter approach is used as the usual payroll deductions will apply.

At the last meeting of the internal campaign committee the matter of contributing by substituting was discussed; it was suggested that an instructor who wishes to pursue that method of contributing should indicate to the appropriate department or program head that (s)he wishes to be scheduled for substitute work for the endowment fund campaign. We've never done this before but I'm quite certain the approach is valid, reasonable and responsible.

One other point: the KEC internal endowment fund committee has agreed that KEC's major thrust should be financial aid for students and I would urge your support of the committee's decision. There are other worthy causes within the College and, should you wish to designate your contribution for another appropriate purpose, your wish will be honoured.

Thank you for reading this item to this point, and thank you for your support.

Please note audio/visual materials are $\underline{\text{excluded}}$ under the present Textbook Agreement.




