'Education & Economic Development' theme of Colleges and Institutes Week

The provincial government has proclaimed Colleges and Universities Week from November 4 to November 9 in British Columbia.

The proclamation - which was announced today by Education Minister Jack Heinrich - recognizes the contribution provincial institutions make to the well being of individuals, society and the B.C. economy. British Columbia has 20 community colleges and institutes which teach technical skills, trades and academic (university transfer) courses.

In announcing the proclamation Mr. Heinrich emphasized that B.C. post-secondary institutions have become active participants in the economic development of their local communities. "We are seeing the colleges and institutes expand their traditional role and involve themselves in research and retraining in response to changing technology."


The Minister described two such partnerships which have recently developed between local industry and post-secondary institutions.

In Surrey a local computer company has contracted Kwantlen College to test electronic circuit boards and predict the service-life of high-tech components. The contract will provide practical "hands-on" experience for technical students while at the same time enabling a local employer to compete in national markets.

A second project in Squamish involves a retraining partnership between Western Pulp Ltd. and the provincial Open Learning Institute (OLI). The pulp company recently completed a \$214 million conversion to state-of-the-art technology at its Squamish plant, and OLI prepared the course materials for retraining local pulpworkers to use the new systems. The new skills enabled the workers to remain employable in the face of technological change.

Colleges and Institutes Week will be observed in many institutions with special publicity events to inform the local community about current programs and educational opportunities. These publicity events will vary with each institution, and include local media interviews, speakers' bureaus and -in a few locations - a campus "open house". The Minister urged interested individuals and organizations to contact their local college or institute for details.

The board and staff of McGregor Child Care Centre hope you will take this opportunity to drop in to take a look and ask questions about our daycare centre on King Edward Campus. The centre, offering care to 12 under threes and 25 over threes, is staffed by child care workers. The centre opened in the Spring of 1983 at the then new KEC.

The centre is named after Mr. and Mrs. Robert McGregor, whose generous support gave the centre its start. The campus is on land previously occupied by Mr. McGregor's lumber company. The Ministry of Human Resources, the Vancouver Foundation and the KEC student council also contributed, enabling the college to continue offering child care at the new campus, as it had at the old KEC.

The centre is an important resource to students, many of whom couldn't continue their education without provision for good daycare, as well as to the Mount Pleasant community and the employees of the college.

This fall the centre opened its own playground, giving the children an opportunity for outdoor play right on the centre's own grounds.

The campus was built to accommodate approximately 3600 students; this autumn, over 5900 students were registered. It's somewhat crowded.



Vancouver Community College is pleased to announce two instructor training initiatives: The <u>Train the Trainer Program</u> and the advanced <u>Instructor Training Program</u>. Both programs are college certificate programs and are offered at the Vancouver Vocational Institute (VVI) campus (250 West Pender Street) Vancouver, B.C.

The programs constitute a two step human development training process leading to a fully qualified and highly motivated post-secondary instructor. Secondly, upon completion of both programs, the individual will have completed the Instructor's Diploma (I.D.) equivalency. (and more please turn to page 3).

TRAIN THE TRAINER PROGRAM

The Train the Trainer Program is designed to prepare the technician, technologist, tradesperson or professional with the necessary knowledge and skills to train others in their area of specialization. Upon completion of the program the graduate is reinforced through both the course completion record and the College Certificate. He/she, furthermore, receives credit for the first half of the advanced Instructor Training Program (see page 2) and is thus motivated to continue on a professional development route.

The program emphasizes a highly practical 'hands-on' approach to the design, delivery and evaluation of instruction and comprises of four courses: Program Design, Giving of Instruction, Evaluation of Learning and a Practicum.

The first three courses may be taken in any sequence, the Practicum is conducted on a tutorial basis at a place suitable for the individual student. A Vancouver Community College Certificate is awarded to students who successfully complete the 120 hour program.

The program goals are to:

- design and develop training plans and programs
- organize learning materials to provide the optimum learning experiences
- plan and conduct training sessions
- use and appraise several methods of conducting instruction
- develop and use evaluation and testing procedures
- develop and use training aids
- develop and use instructional support print materials
- provide feedback of trainees

INSTRUCTOR TRAINING PROGRAM

The <u>Instructor Training Program</u> is an advanced training program designed to provide the technician, technologist, tradesperson or professional with the necessary knowledge and skills to successfully design, plan, prepare, manage and evaluate instruction in college, institution, or private/public sector setting.

The program emphasizes a highly practical 'hands-on' approach to instructor training and comprises of seven courses.

A College Certificate is awarded to participants who successfully complete the Train the Trainer program (or equivalent) plus the four advanced courses:

Adult Evaluation and Education, Instructional Media Use, Evaluation of Instruction, Introduction to Computer Support Applications. The courses may be taken in any sequence.

The program goals are to:

- design and develop curriculum at program, course, and lesson levels
- identify various instructional and learning styles
- plan and conduct instructional/training sessions
- use and appraise several methods of conducting instruction
- develop and use evaluation and testing procedures
- develop and use training aids
- develop and practice use of instructional media
- communicate effectively with students/trainees, instructional support personnel, and other instructors
- apply principles of adult education and development to design and delivery of instruction
- explain fundamental computer concepts
- use computer terminology
- use specific computer applications including BASIC that support the instructional process

A graduate of the VCC/VVI Instructor Training Program receives the Instructor's Diploma (I.D.) equivalency from Vancouver Community College.
