COLLEGE BOARD MEETING

The VCC Board met in regular session yesterday evening, Wednesday, January 22nd.

The President's Report to the Board had been distributed prior to the meeting. As an addition to the report - a copy of which is in the KEC Library for your information - Mr. Gallagher mentioned the appointment of VVI Principal Hans Rerup to two civic advisory groups: the Economic Development Committee and the Victory Square Renovation Task Force. The President also announced the appointment of the College's Director of Contract Development, Tom Toulson, to the Canadian Job Strategies Advisory Council.

Dr. Chapman reported on behalf of B.C.A.C. and a visitor, the president of that body, Rev. Walter Donald, addressed the Board respecting B.C.A.C. concerns.

Mrs. Miller reported on behalf of the Administration Committee of the Board and of significance to KEC was the approval of the Board to a KEC Student Advisory Committee initiative respecting the use of excess parking space in the KEC parking lots during Expo '86, revenues therefrom being designated for student financial aid.

Dr. Chapman reported for the Education and Student Services Committee; of significance in that report was the 1986/87 program profile and plan for VCC and the Board's approval thereof.

President Gallagher reported briefly on discussions that have taken place - at the senior administration level - with Capilano College on how VCC and Capilano can work together. The small joint committee is still at the talking stage; Mr. Gallagher will report as developments take place.

A copy of the minutes of the meeting of November 27th, the agenda for yesterday's meeting along with the background material and the President's report are in the library for your perusal.

During the private session of the Board, amongst other items, the collective agreements with the Langara Faculty Association and the VMREU were approved.



PIONEER EDUCATOR DIES

It was with great sadness that Vancouver Community College noted the passing of Dean H. Goard on January 5. He was a pioneer in B.C. education. Goard was the founding principal of the college's Vancouver Vocational Institute in 1949, a position he held for 12 years. He became principal of the B.C. Institute of Technology in 1967, retiring from that position in 1974.

GENEROUS GENSTAR

The electrical department at Vancouver Vocational Institute was recently given a three generator paralleling switchboard and distribution system by North Vancouver's Genstar Shipyards. The equipment will play an important role in student training. The equipment students used previously was so antiquated replacement parts were impossible to get. The purchase of new equipment would have, cost the college more than \$20,000, so this gift came at a particularly good time.




