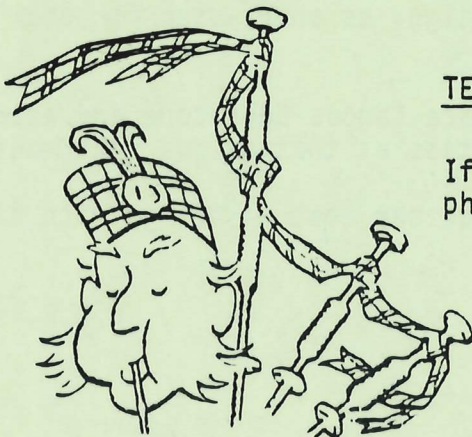

PREAMBLE:

- Canada's Copyright Act is in the process of being revised. Advances in technology since 1924, when the present Act was passed, have made it necessary to restate the relationships between creators and users.
- All documents, including the recent report of the House of Commons sub-committee on the revision of copyright "A Charter of Rights for Creators" indicate a continuation and strengthening of the rights of creators.
- In light of this increased attention to the rights of creators and users, the College is taking the step of clarifying its position respecting those rights.
- The College recognizes the requirement for a substantial stream of information to students in support of education and training. Nevertheless, the provision of that information must conform with the law respecting copyright.
- Should this policy and procedure require revision upon the passage of a new Copyright Act the College will undertake such.

POLICY:

- A.1 Computer software, television programs, printed matter or any other copyrighted or patented material for which the rights are not owned by the College or a College instructor or for which the rights are not in the public domain shall not be reproduced without the written permission of the owner of those rights unless the use falls into the "fair dealing" category of the Canadian Copyright Act. It is understood that the reproduction of all or a substantial portion of any copyrighted work is not permissible under "fair dealing" even for private study, research, criticism, review, or educational purposes.
- A.2 College equipment, services or other resources shall not be used to support infringement of copyright.

PROCEDURES:

- B.1 Upon request the Library Department Head on each campus will undertake the procedure of locating and obtaining information about permission to copy from copyright holders.
 - B.2 Employees wishing to reproduce copyrighted materials shall be responsible for obtaining, in writing, permission to do so and for providing copies of correspondence to the campus library for filing.
 - B.3 Each campus library will maintain a file of correspondence concerning requests for permission to copy and permissions granted and denied.
 - B.4 The College reserves the right to implement normal disciplinary actions for violation of this policy regardless of civil remedies or criminal sanctions undertaken by or on behalf of copyright owners or licensees.

CHALLENGE '86 - BRITISH COLUMBIA/CANADA
SUMMER EMPLOYMENT PROGRAM

The announcement has just been made that Challenge '86 will go ahead this year with an allocation of \$100,000 going to V.C.C. Applications for project proposals should be submitted by Monday, March 10, 1986. Project proposals must fulfill the following guidelines:

- relate to a field of study, discipline, future career, training program, or provide practical work experience which will benefit the student's future employability;
- provide a minimum of 30 hours of work per week but would not normally exceed 40 hours of work per week per employee and last between 6 and 18 consecutive weeks. Applications which propose to provide part-time employment for disabled students are also eligible;
- start no earlier than April 28, 1986 and end no later than September 5, 1986;
- supply adequate training and be appropriately supervised;

In order to be hired, students must meet the following criteria:

- intend to return to school on a full-time basis in the fall;
- are legally entitled to work in Canada;
- have been hired after referral by a Canada Employment Centre for Students or a Canada Employment Centre (unless otherwise agreed to in writing by the Commission);
- are not members of the employer's immediate family.

All proposals must provide non-union work, as the maximum salary paid will be the minimum wage of \$3.65 per hour.

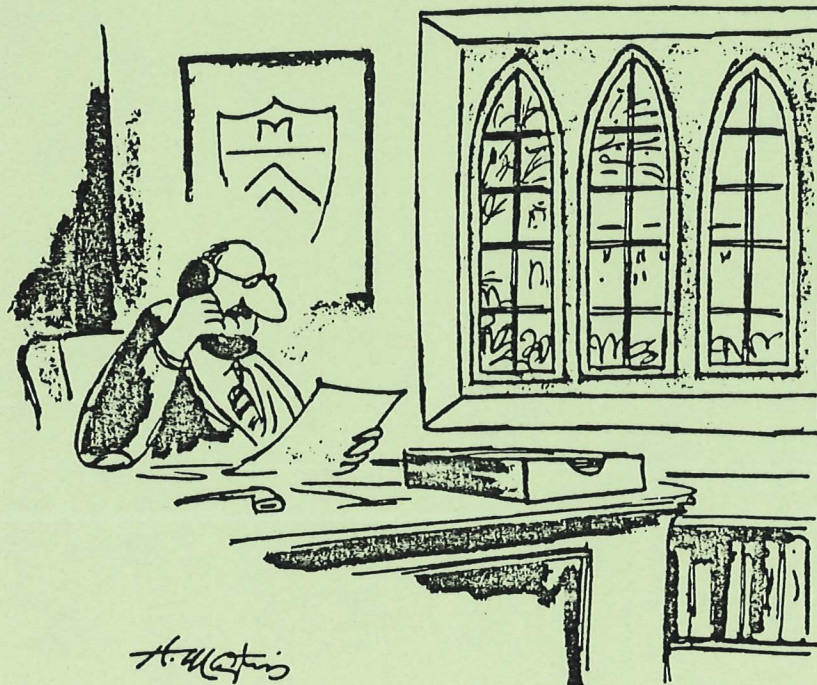
