SIMON FRASER - CONTINUING EDUCATION

Simon Fraser University is continuing to offer a variety of educational television programming on the Knowledge Network. A number of flyers giving dates, times and an outline of their programs for Summer, 1986 are posted on the bulletin boards.

The ten-part television series <u>Mass Communications in Canada</u> explores the role of the mass media and other electronic communication technologies in in Canada. Details on taking the course for credit are included in the flyer.

<u>Perspectives on Women</u>, a series of eight television programs covering a wide range of issues and concerns of women today has been produced for general viewing. Details on taking the course for credit or general interest are outlined in the flyer.

The subjects of both drug use and abuse are emotionally charged. The intention of the two-part series <u>Pleasure and Pain</u>, <u>Drug Use and Abuse</u> is to make British Columbians more aware of the complexity of social strategies for reducing drug use and abuse and of the diversity of opinion that now exists.

During the course of each program, viewers will be able to talk, by telephone, with the host and a guest-expert.

THEFTS ON CAMPUS

In the past couple of weeks we have had a series of thefts throughout the campus. Local alarms have been installed in various areas, security have staggered their shifts, increased their patrols and other security measures have been implemented.

However, help is needed from faculty/staff and students if this problem is to be solved. The following is a list of almost self evident basic security practices. However if carried out, such precautions should diminish if not eliminate campus thievery.

- (a) double check to see if offices are properly locked;
- (b) doors with combination locks should be shut when an area is unoccupied;
- (c) classrooms should be locked during breaks, students should not leave purses or other personal effects in unattended classrooms;
- (d) notify security of any unusual activities of persons loitering near office areas:
- (e) report lost or stolen keys immediately;
- (f) unattended and readily tradable items such as cash or credit cards, should be kept under secure lock and key. Desk drawers, locked or unlocked are a thief's prime target.

If we all work together, we can help make this campus a safer place to work and study in.

In last week's King Edward Times there was a copy of a newspaper article on Sharon Musto, our College Foundations student whom all of us have seen very regularly during the past few years.


Sharon has been a cerebral palsy victim since birth. She will soon graduate with very good grades and enter the BCIT computer program.
