

WHAT IS PROJECT LITERACY BC? (PLBC)

Project Literacy BC is a provincial campaign to promote public awareness about the need for adult literacy. The task force represents community groups, educational institutions, and concerned individuals. Participants come from community colleges, school boards, community educational centres, educational television networks, libraries, the Adult Basic Education Association of BC and the Movement for Canadian Literacy.

Project Literacy BC has adopted a mission statement that includes the objectives of developing local awareness and action through media efforts and a kit of print resources, publishing a directory of all literacy programs in the province, setting up a province-wide telephone referral system, and seeking involvement from government agencies, unions and corporations.

There is no cause for optimism about provincial government support. Current plans call for progressive cuts over the next several years in all adult basic education funding. The challenge that PLBC faces is mobilizing popular support in these circumstances.


PLBC was spurred into action by the prospect of an American media blitz on literacy (Project Literacy United States), and crucial organizing work has been provided by Vancouver-based employees of KCTS, the Seattle PBS station.

Literacy workers across Canada need to be aware of this coordinated American broadcasting effort to create literacy awareness and actions, and to plan how to make use of it.

ABC and PBS will begin broadcasting about literacy in September. There will be news items, documentaries and public service announcements of literacy, and serial-plots including literacy themes.

The United States programming promises to play heavily of the "scourge of illiteracy" theme, the 23 million "individual tragedies", and the costs of illiteracy in welfare payment, crime control and corporate income loss.

This media effort will come into Canada through the airwaves, almost certainly stimulating inquiries from potential learners and volunteers. It may also provide a boost to public awareness efforts here, and at the same time raise the need for distinctive Canadian definitions of the literacy issue.

TELEVISION PROGRAMMING

September 3, 1986: The kick-off documentary for PLUS, "At a Loss for Words: Illiterate in America", narrated by Peter Jennings and sponsored by IBM, will be aired on the ABC television network at 10:00 p.m.

September 17, 1986: KCTS/9 local documentary, "I'm Not Stupid, I Just Can't Read", airs at 7:30 p.m., followed by the PBS national documentary, "A Chance to Learn".

September 07, 1986: "This Week With David Brinkley" on ABC will focus on adult illiteracy.

September 08-12, 1986: "ABC World News Tonight With Peter Jennings" will carry a multi-part Special Assignment report on illiteracy.

Also during September, "Nightline" and "20/20" will cover the subject, at times yet to be announced.

Unscheduled: "ABC Weekend Special", "Loving", and "Good Morning America" will all feature illiteracy sometime during the new season.

Beginning October 27, 1986: A new GED series from Kentucky Educational Television will air on KCTS/9 every Monday and Friday at noon. This series of 44 half-hours goes through all of the information covered in the GED examination.

PUBLIC SERVICE ANNOUNCEMENTS

ABC is producing seven network PSA's featuring ABC President Jim Duffy in two, and adult learners in the remaining five.

KCTS/9 is producing a local PSA which is available to all local stations.

CBC network is producing a PSA which is available to all local stations.

CBC network is producing a PSA which can be scheduled by the regional networks, with a window for local contacts.

ABC is also planning 5-second network ID's using ABC celebrities to push the PLUS message, similar to the "Don't Drink and Drive" campaign on ABC a short time ago.







A WORD FROM THE WISE

I would like to share with you the following excerpt of a letter I received recently from John Griffiths. John retired on July 31 after ten years as a College Foundations instructor.

R.F.C.

"My 10 years at King Edward were the happiest time in my professional life. In the beginning of my career I had youth, a certain eagerness, two Stanford degrees, and not too much wisdom.
