COLLEGE BOARD MEETING

The VCC Board met for its regular monthly meeting yesterday evening, Wednesday, September 24th.

A large number of items were on the Board's agenda, some having already been discussed by a Board Committee; others coming from the Board's several liaison trustees; and still others appearing as new items of business. The following brief notes provide an inkling of the thrust of the Board's business.

The Board Chairman reported that, in a letter from the Minister, funding will be provided to colleges to offer additional courses/programs that employees at Expo will be able to take when their employment ceases mid-October.

Dr. Denholm, Langara Principal, and members of the architectural and consulting firms explained the renovations being contemplated for the Langara campus. Problem: the plans, as presently drawn, will cost more than the assured funding will allow. The Board asked the administration to continue to work on the plans to bring the plans in line with the funding available.

The Board approved the College's Educational Plan update, as discussed in depth at the Education and Student Services Committee. As well, the Board approved the ELSELC - (Entry Level Sign and English Language Communication) - Statement of Program Objectives.

In early summer, VVI Student Association office manager and ombudsman Mark Rogen presented to the CEC a detailed paper on Sexism in Colleges. This was subsequently presented and discussed by the Education and Student Services Committee of the Board and, at yesterday evening's Board meeting, received for the record. (A copy of the report is on file in the KEC Library.)

College President Paul Gallagher gave progress reports on

- Protocol of Cooperation with BCIT;
- Termination of programs at Maple Ridge Campus (of BCIT);
- Affiliation with Native Education Centre.

Among other agenda items, the Board

- approved the Professional Photographers Association Bursary (Langara);
- received information respecting the visiting team (External Team) vis-a-vis VCC's Institutional Evaluation; the team will be in Vancouver for its task on October 14th to 17th.

Board member Pamela Glass reported that a College Showcase at Expo is scheduled for October 3rd, 4th and 5th. (KEC's Music Department will be very visible.)

With yesterday's meeting, the "President's Report to the Board" was replaced by "The Centres' Report". The items for these reports are still assembled and collated, etc. in the President's office and distributed under their green covers. Yesterday's report as well as the minutes of the previous meeting and documentation respecting agenda items, etc. have been submitted to the KEC Library for your information.

The next Board meeting was changed from October 22nd to 29th.

Remember, all old routings have been discontinued. Be the first on your block to hand in your requests! If the list is unavailable through your department, the library has extra copies.

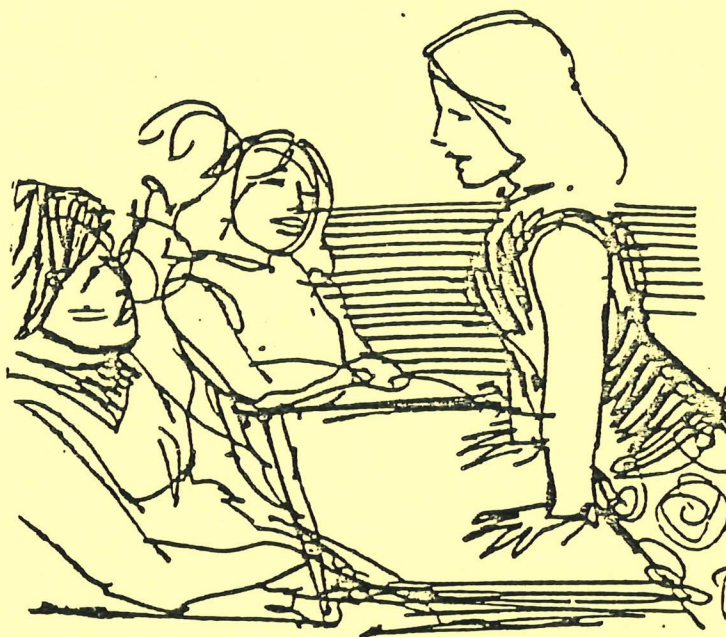

SUPERANNUATION COMMISSION FIELD TRIPS
TO THE LOWER MAINLAND

Representatives from the Superannuation Commission travel to the Lower Mainland once every month, except August, to meet employees and employers covered under the various pension plans that the Commission administers. These trips usually take place on either the first or second Thursday and Friday of each month. The interviews are scheduled to be held at the Government Agency in New Westminster Thursday afternoon and Government Personnel Services Division in downtown Vancouver Friday mornings.

The main objective of these visits is to provide personal counselling to employees who are contemplating retirement within the next year or two. However, the Superannuation Commission is also prepared to schedule interviews with employer representatives to discuss various features of the pension plans and the Commission policies and procedures.

If an employee is contemplating retirement and only requires an estimate of his/her pension, please have them write or telephone this office.

CITIES IN CRISIS! **NEW COURSE** 504901

Throughout most of the urban world, where almost half of the earth's population will be located by the end of the century, startling growth patterns are reaching crisis proportions. In 1950, London, New York and Shanghai had 10 million or more inhabitants. By the year 2000, there will be 20 such megacities, 18 of them in countries least able to afford them. What is happening and what can be done?

This course will explore the reasons behind the crisis facing urban societies and examine innovative responses to the problems of rapid urbanization. Case studies from Europe, the Americas and the developing countries will be used to identify the central themes and principles, and participants will be encouraged to take an active part in the discussions. WHAT MAKES CITIES WORK? **NEW COURSE** 504902

While it may seem that urban settlements and the human activity within them are haphazardly organized, there are, in fact, identifiable factors which can be used to help explain patterns and processes of urban growth and decline. This course will introduce basic concepts used by urban analysts to describe and investigate the patterns and systems which emerge from city form and function. Using case studies from a variety of countries at different time periods, we will explore fundamental issues of cities and in cities to show the dynamic but complex interrelationships between social, economic and political forces which have shaped urbanization. Vancouver will be used as a reference point. The course will require the active participation of the group. (A. Fallick)

PREAMBLE:

This policy is designed to assist students who are in need, and who are found worthy, of receiving financial aid, but who for valid reason cannot obtain the necessary financial assistance to enrol or to continue studies at King Edward Campus. However, because of budget limitations, the number of students assisted under this policy shall not exceed 50 full-time equivalents in a given fiscal year.

POLICY:

- A.1 The Dean of Administrative and Student Services, or delegate, may waive all or part of the tuition and other fees for a student who is found to be in financial need but who cannot receive financial aid from regular college or other sources.

PROCEDURES:

- B.1 The Financial Aid Advisor, or delegate, must sign the Tuition Fee Waiver form (attached) indicating that KEC is unable to provide the necessary financial aid for that student to enrol or to continue studies at this campus.
- B.2 If recommending a fee waiver, the division chairman shall complete and sign the appropriate portion of the Tuition Fee Waiver form and forward it to the Dean of Administrative and Student Services, or delegate, for action.
- B.3 The Dean, or delegate, will advise the following respecting his decision concerning the individual tuition fee waiver recommendations: the appropriate division chairman; the Manager of Admissions, Registration and Student Records; and the Manager of Financial and Ancillary Services.
- B.4 The appropriate division chairman will inform the student respecting the disposition of the fee waiver application.
- B.5 The Manager of Admissions, Registration and Student Records will be responsible for retaining applications for tuition fee waivers, whether granted or not.

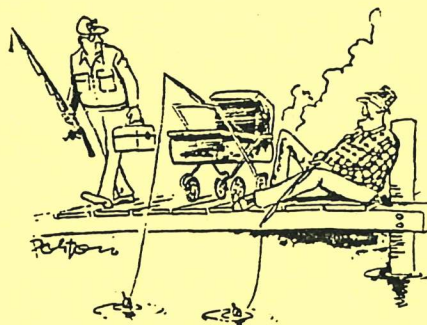

The ENGLISH PLACEMENT TEST (EPT) has been replaced by a modified exam known as the LANGUAGE PROFICIENCY INDEX (LPI).

The next administration of the LANGUAGE PROFICIENCY INDEX (LPI) is scheduled for Tuesday, NOVEMBER 4 at 7 p.m.. This test will be provided at major centres throughout the province.

The new LPI will take the place of the EPT as part of the enrollment requirements of UBC, University of Victoria, Langara and many of the colleges in B.C. The institute you plan to attend can advise you of their policy with regard to these requirements.

PRE-REGISTRATION IS REQUIRED before October 22, 1986.
