ATTENUION: INSTRUCTORS & DEPARTMENT HEADS

The KEC Student Advisory Committee advise the following: In April, 1984, the King Edward Campus Student Association Executive committee members all resigned. Several of them urged the campus administration to assume responsibility for the orderly and effective offering of student activities at KEC. The Student Association fee of \$10.75 per term has not been charged KEC students since May 25, 1984. Instead, to this date, students pay an activity fee of one dollar for each month of their registration. The student Advisory Committee, a group of student volunteers, assists the Dean of Student Services in planning student activities and in spending the student activity fees.

Next week, a one-page survey of 11 questions will poll KEC student opinion regarding student government options such as (1) reviving the KEC Student Society (2) retaining the current Student Advisory Committee (3) establishing a new student council, or (4) no student association at all.

With your assistance, a good sampling of all students in this survey-of-the-whole can occur. A sample of the questionnaire with a sample of the answer card superimposed follows. It should be fairly easy to administer with your help. More detailed instructions will be found in your boxes next week. The actual questionnaires and answer cards will be available on the 4th floor adjacent to the staff mail boxes.

While initiated by the departing chairman, Bob Gauthier, I have been asked to take over the duties of the SAC chair for the present. In the interests of good student government, would you please assist students in the completion of this instrument and oversee the return to the box on the 4th floor.



ABE AND ESL AS PROVINCIAL ELECTION PRIORITIES FOR EDUCATION

As you know we are in the midst of a provincial election. Numerous issues have already been put forward by the candidates and their parties as being central to British Columbia's present and future well-being.

Adult education has not been mentioned.

The Advocacy Committee of PACE is anxious to have adult education's voice heard during the campaign, and elicits your help.

Adult illiteracy was identified as being a major issue for the PACE Board to address during its term of office. The Board's Advocacy Committee has taken this up and has been active in supporting the Adult Basic Education Association in its Project Literacy B.C. efforts. With the election call there is now the opportunity for all educators to become active.

You might carry out any of the following advocacy activities, either on your own or with friends or colleagues:

- 1) write a letter to your local candidates and/or to the political parties
- 2) attend an all candidates meeting and pose a question to the hopefuls
- 3) write a letter to the editor of your local paper
- 4) inform others of the issue and ask them to support it as suggested above.

This request of you is entirely <u>non partisan</u>. We believe all candidates and all parties should be asked to state their concern and support. If you require additional information on illiteracy in B.C., including the names of persons in your area who are directly involved with the issue,


REMINDER REGARDING TIMESHEETS

The timesheets for instructors, clerical staff and student aides should be submitted to the Payroll Clerk by noon on Thursday's. Anyone who fails to submit timesheets by the specified time risks the possibility of missing the payroll cut off and therefore may also miss receiving a pay cheque for that week.

Also, kindly ensure that the timesheets are completed in full. For those of you who handle instructor timesheets, kindly ensure that if the person is new, you include their address and social insurance number on the form. For clerical and student aide timesheets, the most common omission is the rate of pay and the account number. It is very time consuming for the Payroll Clerk to look up this information every week. Please, if you do not know your rate of pay and account number, call the Payroll Clerk at Local 733 who will be glad to furnish you with this information.

If you are clerical staff or a student aide and are receiving the yellow computerized timesheets, please use them. When completed, send BOTH THE YELLOW AND THE PINK COPY TO THE Payroll Clerk. DO NOT KEEP THE PINK COPY!
