PHARMACY TECHNICAL ASSISTANT PROGRAM

The new Pharmacy Technical Assistant Program, which prepares students for employment in commercial and/or hospital pharmacies, commenced January 5, 1987. Considerable curriculum development work, drawing upon the expertise of practitioners in the field and the valuable advice and assistance of the Program Advisory Committee, has culminated in a comprehensive and technically up-to-date program unique in this province.

Negotiations with private sector firms have resulted in excellent cooperation and donations from two firms (Zadall Systems Group Ltd. and Pharmacom Systems (1986) Ltd.) to install computerized pharmacy system software and support to an approximate total value of \$15,000.

Other VCC supporting functions, such as the Purchasing Department and Information and Computer Services, were extremely helpful and efficient in their assistance to launch the new program under very tight time and resource constraints.

WHEN IT'S AN EMERGENCY ...

One of your students is having a seizure, or has fainted, or has battery acid in his eyes, or is severely injured. How do you get help?

In a health emergency it is important to phone the campus emergency number (local 777) as soon as possible. DO NOT leave the ill person alone - have someone else call for you - remember to give your room number, a brief description of what is happening, and mention if the person has severe bleeding, severe chest pain, or is having difficulty breathing.

The 777 number is answered in priority to all other calls and the nurse, security, and a first aid attendant will all be immediately notified to come to assist you.

In an emergency PLEASE DO NOT call local 209 (nurse's office), and please do not send someone running to the nurse's office. The nurse may be out of her office, or may be involved with a patient and unable to answer the phone. This can cause a delay of several minutes and possibly serious consequences for the ill or injured person.

All campus phones should have a yellow sticker fixed to them with the emergency number. If you know of a phone with no sticker, please contact security and they will provide one for you.

COOP RADIO SHOW: CHERNOBYL, THE AFTERMATH






