
AIDS AWARENESS CAMPAIGN - STUDENT HEALTH SERVICES:

Thought it was time to write and let you know that Erin and I are healthy and happy.

We're becoming absolute experts at moving and moved again on Halloween. This time, we'll stay put for awhile. We are renting a little log home nestled in the trees on 4 acres. The Slavey are an interesting group - well the band on the reserve is, anyway. They are searching for a balance between their old cultural values and their perceived need of todays technological luxuries (necessities). But most native groups are searching for such a balance. There's something else, that's deeper and more elusive. I feel it, so far, but as yet haven't intellectualized it (my nemesis?).


