
THE "NEW" FIRST ANNUAL CHRISTMAS CHAMPAGNE PARTY:

iteracy may be a dream for millions of Canadians, but agencies and groups across the country have devised down-to-Earth approaches to prevention of illiteracy, teaching, research and or-

ganizing.

Here's a selection of proven successes and promising innovations:

YES Canada

Sally is reviewing calculations for volume and area, Tom is practising fractions, Daryt is laboring at prepositions, Lee is brushing up sentence composition. Robert is finding reasoning a breeze, Diana is getting help on the sermeolon and colon and Doug is marking test answers on a card that can be read by a scanner.


Heather Armstrong is teaching all seven, helped by one human assistant and several hundred microchips

in 10 computers.

Just as the publicity claims, YES (Youth Employment Skills) Canada in St. Catharines, Ont. operates like un electronic one-room schoolhouse,

right down to the instant marking.
"Only 35 per cent," says a downcast Doug when the scanner spews
out his test grade.

Just a temporary setback in the newest approach to tackling the problem of jobless youth between 16 and 24. Similar projects started this spring in Halifax, Winnipeg and Van-conver, largely financed by a \$3.1.


