# THE GREAT TUNNEL PROJECT:

Some of you have been wondering whether KEC is the starting point for a tunnel under Burrard Inlet. I hope the answer is no!

The problem seems simple but the answer is turning out to be complicated and expensive. For a year or more water has been seeping into the corridor outside the Trades Area and, in order to find the cause, excavation was begun at the east end of the corridor. Further exploration indicated that the water was coming from some more distant point; hence the excavation outside the Library entrance.

What has been discovered thus far is a faulty network of drainage pipes under the quadrangle which means that water has been gradually accumulating under the floor, thus increasing the pressure on the corridor wall facing the Trades Area.

The problem must be solved to avoid the collapse of the corridor walk. Current cost estimates stand at \$250,000 and the Bursar has made applications to the Ministry for emergency funding.

#### PREAMBLE:

The KEC Campus complies with the Vancouver Health By-Law on smoking and smoking is permitted only in a designated smoking area. For direction see Policy No. 5.2.1.4 - Compliance with City Health By-law 4387 -(Restricted Smoking).

#### POLICY:

- All administrators, faculty, staff and students share in the collective responsibility to maintain a clean, comfortable and healthy environment. Positive action in supporting and A.I encouraging colleagues in this regard is part of this responsibility.
- Responsibility for the general tidiness of the campus will be shared by all users of campus facilities. A.1.1
- 2.2 General maintenance and cleaning of the campus is carried out under contract; responsibility for which is vested in the Director of Buildings and Grounds.
- 4.3 The consumption of food and beverages is not permitted in classrooms, the laboratories, the auditorium, snops assigned to the mechanical trades training programs, wasnrooms, corridors, stairwells, and other areas so designated by the King Edward Campus.

#### PPOCEDUPES:

- The Building Services Manager will ensure that sufficient ashtrays are provided where smoking is permitted as well as trash 8.1 receptacles.
- Faculty and students will ensure that classrooms are left clean and tidy by:

  - (i) erasing blackboards/whiteboards;(ii) leaving desks, tables, chairs, etc. in an orderly
  - arrangement; and (iii) disposing of garcage (waste paper, etc.) in provided receptables.
- Day-to-day problems with respect to maintenance and cleaning are to be referred to the Building Services Manager.
- To lessen the effect of side-stream tobacco smoke entering the air circulation system, fans may need to be installed in windows to take the smoke out of offices, lounges, etc. where smoking is permitted.

Principal | Approval:

To comply with the City of Vancouver Health By-Law on smoking which is now in effect, King Edward Campus will be classified as "Smoking is Permitted Only in a Designated Smoking Area". (Health By-law 4387 and the amending By-law 5994.)

#### POLICY

A.1

The areas designated for student smokers will be:
(a) approximately 50% of the student dining room
(b) 2 student lounges, rooms 2117 and 3198
(c) approved designated areas in the mechanical trades area on level one

4.2

The areas designated for staff/faculty smokers will be:
(a) room 2142 (part of the staff/faculty dining room)
(b) private offices (if the following conditions are met)
i) that the office be free of smoke when students are being interviewed, counselled or tutored
ii) that smoke does not drift into common hallways

or other offices iii) that there are no complaints from other users

of the area iv) that the nicotine level meets standards set by

the Vancouver Smoking By-Law

v) that ionizers or other machines purchased by the
individual to eliminate smoke in a given office
be suitable to reduce the nicotine level

vi) that there be sufficient ventilation directly to the outside of the building

#### PROCEDURES

- Students, faculty and staff who are found violating the by-law will be given warning in writing by administration or delegate.
- Students, faculty and staff who continue to violate the smoking by-law may be subject to further disciplinary action on the part of the College. 3.2

# INTERNATIONAL EDUCATION BULLETIN

# VISITS & CONFERENCES

A delegation of Chinese and University officials from the City of Chendu, Province of Sichuan, visited the College on September 15, 1987. The group was accompanied by Mr. Quian Jin, interpreter and a former VCC student.

A group of five Chinese presidents and vice-presidents from industrial, commercial and vocational colleges visited on November 10, 1987. The purpose of both Chinese visits was to gain first-hand information regarding the organization, administration, philosophy and mandate of Canadian Community Colleges.

Dr. Patricia Groves of King Edward Campus dealt with the Association of Canadian Community Colleges in order to make arrangements for both visits. Senior administrators, including Paul Gallagher, Lawrence Fast, J.J. Denholm, H.W. Rerup and Tom Toulson, participated and gave presentations.

Four college personnel (Tom Toulson, Patricia Groves, Max Fleming and Jindra Repa) attended the Annual Conference of the Canadian Bureau for International Education in Quebec City on Oct. 31 - Nov. 2nd. Max Fleming completed his term as a member of the CBIE Board. Tom Toulson was elected to serve. Congratulations!

The conference, which focused on International Education Policies, gave us an opportunity to exchange views on a broad range of topics in the international education field.

In early December, Richard Pearce and Ian Andrews returned from their extended mission to southeast Asia (Japan, China, Hong Kong, Malaysia, Singapore, Indonesia). We look forward to their reports on what appears to have been a successful venture.

# PROGRAM NEWS

For the September to December term, we had 350 international students enrolled at VCC. Most of these students were at King Edward (210) with 140 at Langara. Over 20 countries in Asia, Latin America, the Caribbean and Europe are represented, with the leading source countries being Hong Kong, Japan, Taiwan and China. We expect the overall enrollment to rise to approximately 500 students by September 1988.

Mr. Wei-he Liu, Assistant Professor, Guangzhou University, completed his one-year International Master Student Program at VCC and returned to his home institution. Two master students from the North China University of Technology arrived to commence their one-year program. Brian Pendleton of Langara will be introducing the students to various College departments and groups.

VCC will coordinate, on an interim basis, the activities of the newly created B.C./Japan Consortium. The purpose of the Consortium is to provide B.C. colleges with a joint access to marketing, orientation and testing services in Japan. The Consortium has applied to the Ministry of Advanced Education for funding of the Consortium's coordinator position.

# TEACHING OPPORTUNITIES OVERSEAS

VCC has established links with Tokushima University in Japan. David Kos and William McMichael are the two instructors currently appointed to teach at Tokushima as a result of VCC's referral. We expect to fill a third teaching position starting in April 1988.

Selkirk College has developed a number of contacts in Korea, including Hyundai Managerial Development Institute, the Samsung Group and Chung Ang University. One-year and summer teaching positions are available in 1988. For details call VCC International Education at 875-8233.

Two at King Edward Campus - Diesel Mechanic Technician and Automotive Mechanic Technician programs.


Two at the Vancouver Vocational Institute - Computer Operator/Programmer and Electronics Technician.
