People could live together in peace on this planet - if governments will help end the arms race.

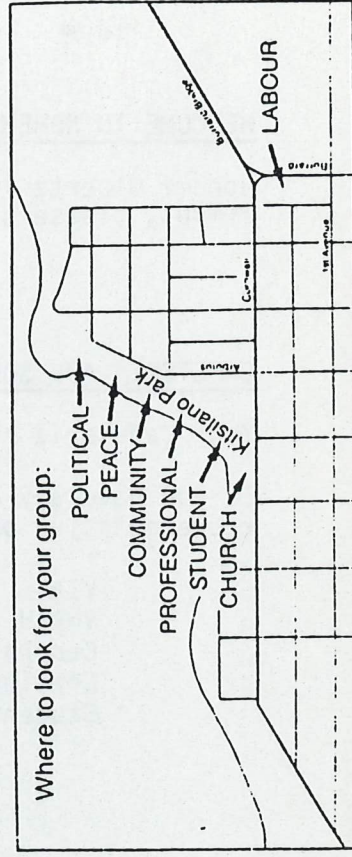
By walking for peace in April we can send a message to the governments of this world that we care about the future.

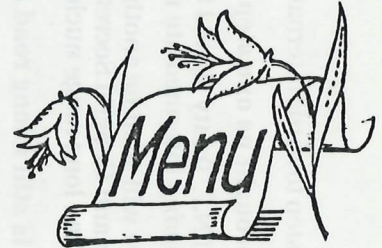

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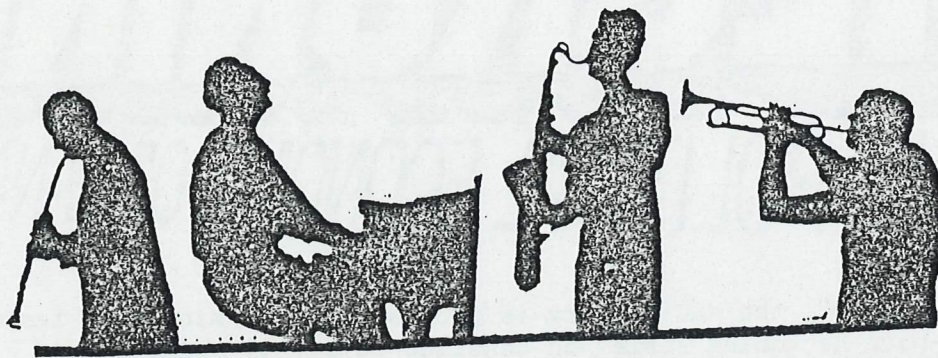

## THE POLITICAL ECONOMY OF CANADA

### PART FOUR: IN BED WITH AN ELEPHANT

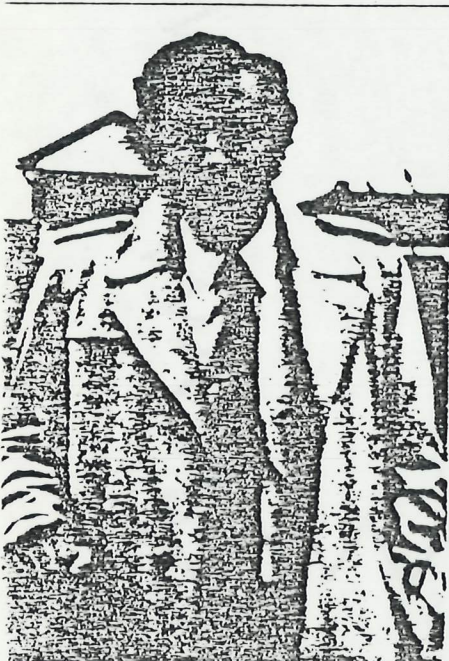
FRIDAY, APRIL 29, 12:00 NOON
