ACC AND C-PAC

The Association of Canadian Community Colleges (ACCC) has identified five key issues to promote through advocacy efforts in 1988/1989. In order of priority established by the six ACCC regions across Canada, they are: 1. Adult Literacy; 2. Accessibility; 3. Free Trade; 4. Science and Technology; and 5. Canadian Jobs Strategy (apprenticeship). Literacy remains the number one focus for the second straight year.

In order to advise the ACCC Board, there are two committees: the Canadian Program Advisory Committee (C-PAC) and the International Program Advisory Committee (I-PAC). Both these committees have regional representation as well as special expertise representation for consultation. C-PAC where I have been elected to serve representing BC/Yukon, has 17 members from all across Canada's colleges, CEGEP's and institutes.

At this week's meetings on September 23 and 24, the C-PAC agenda will cover (1) the ACCC Conference Strategy; (2) Literacy; (3) Research; (4) Student Needs; (5) Member Service Strategy; (6) Professional Development; (7) Review of Awards Program; (8) Inter-college Communications (data base) as well as ACCC matters.

I will circulate some ACCC materials on behalf of adult literacy to the three Division chairs. If anyone has comments for me to bring to the C-PAC meeting on any of the eight agenda items above, I would be happy to hear from you.

To note: there will be regional ACCC consultation with BC/Yukon colleges on October 27 and 28 at the OLA in Richmond. Anyone can attend this meeting. More on this consultation in future issues.




THE COMPUTER NEEDS COMMITTEE MEMBERSHIP LIST

FINANCIAL AID INFORMATION

WORK-STUDY PROGRAM

<u>AIMS:</u> This is a component of B.C.S.A.P., designed to diminish student indebtedness and to service students' needs not met by B.C.S.A.P. through employment opportunities on campus.

WHO IS ELIGIBLE?

- 1. For B.C.S.A.P. participants
 You may apply if currently you are taking out a B.C.S.A.P. loan
 and
 - i) demonstrate a financial need in excess of your B.C.S.A.P. award
- or ii) wish to repay a portion of your current or previous B.C.S.A.P. loan.
 - 2. <u>For Non-B.C.S.A.P. participants</u>
 If you are not eligible for B.C.S.A.P., you may still apply provided you
 - i) qualify for B.C. residency under B.C.S.A.P. criteria
 - ii) are not in default of previous Canada/B.C. student loans
 - iii) are enrolled in full-time studies and have maintained a satisfactory scholastic standard,
- and iv) demonstrate financial need

HOW TO APPLY:

- Get a work study application from the Financial Aid Office.
 Complete and return it to the same office as soon as possible.
- 2. <u>Deadline</u>: Sept. 23, 1988. This applies to <u>non-B.C.S.A.P.</u> participants only.
- 3. Once your financial need is established, you will be referred to the appropriate departments/offices for job placements. However jobs are only offered to qualified candidates with appropriate skills.

WHAT KIND OF JOBS AND WHAT IS THE PAY?

Check the vacancies for Student Aides posted on the noticeboard outside the Financial Aid Office. The job descriptions will give you a general idea of positions available and skills required.

N.B.

Non-B.C.S.A.P. participants - Only a very limited number of positions are available for this category of students. No applications will be accepted after <u>September 23rd</u>.

K.E.C. BURSARIES

How much are the bursaries? What are they for?

The value of each bursary ranges from \$30 to \$250, depending on the availability of funds and number of applicants. Students may use their bursary money to meet their unmet financial need, e.g. to pay for their books or busfare.

Who can apply?

Part-time and full-time KEC students who:

- (1) can demonstrate financial need after they have exhausted all other avenues of financial assistance; and
- (2) are attending classes regularly and progressing satisfactorily in their courses of study.

When and how can I apply?

Bursary applications are available at both the Financial Aid Office and the Counselling Career Centre in January, May and September. Completed applications should be returned to the Financial Aid Office. The deadline is THE LAST DAY OF JANUARY, MAY AND SEPTEMBER. The results will be given out one month after the deadline.
