- conducting regular walk-about of the campus to review the safety of working conditions and procedures
- developing measures to protect or improve the health and safety of employees or students
- carrying out accident investigations; recommending and/or monitoring changes to correct unsafe working conditions and practices
- receiving, considering, investigating or resolving complaints and queries raised by colleagues with regard to industrial health and safety in the workplace
- promoting programs or events related to the health and safety of employees and students

- i) Further recommendations will be put forward by the subcommittee to enable the Health & Safety committee to prepare a set of emergency procedures to be followed in event of an earthquake. - iii) General business included discussions of hallway cleanliness in certain campus areas, liability insurance and transportation of employees or students for medical attention, as well as the regular accident investigation and campus walk-about reports.

The next meeting of the Joint Committee will be held on April 13, 1988.

MARCH SKIES FEATURE PLANETARY PARADE

If you have noticed the bright planets, Venus and Jupiter, in the evening sky, or Mercury, Mars and Saturn in the pre-dawn hours, then you'll likely enjoy this month's new moon. Watch for it low on the western horizon on Friday, March 18, just after sunset. It will be much easier to see Saturday, while on Sunday (20th) look for it between Venus and Jupiter - a fitting configuration for the vernal equinox which signals the beginning of Spring!

Constellation lovers can still catch a good view of Orion with nearby Taurus and Pleiades. Recent clear skies have given people born under Gemini and Leo a chance to see their sunsign constellations overhead.

KEC COMMITTEE ON SEXUAL HARASSMENT:

"Every study conducted on a campus, either in Canada or the United States, shows that sexual harassment is a problem" (E.S. Soloman. A paper presented at the Alberta Student Services Conference, 1986). For instance, a University of Calgary survey stated that 30% of undergraduates encountered sexually inappropriate behaviour. Many of these behaviours emanated from male students but 27% came from people in authority over these students.

Sexual harassment is difficult to define as "it may range from sexual innuendo made at inappropriate times, perhaps in the guise of humour, to coerced sexual relations" (B.C. Federation of Labour). Although sexual harassment typically involves a female as victim, both males and females can be harassed by members of either sex.

Most colleges in B.C. now have or are in the process of developing a policy regarding sexual harassment on their campuses. Such a policy allows the college to deal with this problem in a consistent and fair manner while safeguarding the legal and human rights of all individuals involved.

V.C.C. has no policy on sexual harassment. Over the past year, a committee at Langara has been examining the issue. It seems clear that any proposed policy should involve the participation of representatives from all campuses. The Langara committee has distributed a questionnaire to faculty to find out the extent of this problem. They are formulating a questionnaire for students.

A committee at KEC on sexual harassment is being set up. The purpose would be education of this issue and to participate in the proposal of a VCC policy. We hope to have representation from faculty, staff, students and administrators.

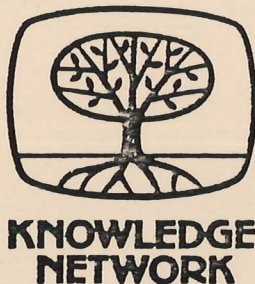

AIDS: QUEST FOR UNDERSTANDING

"Your next sexual partner could be
that very special person. The one
that gives you AIDS!"

A special series of programs - AIDS: QUEST FOR UNDERSTANDING - will begin on the Knowledge Network Wednesday, March 23rd at 8:00 PM. This seven part series will focus on the human side of AIDS. Programs developed in England, Canada and New Zealand portray more than just the medical issues revolving around this disease, examining a range of human subjects that our entire society is encountering on a regular basis.

The series begins with CAN AIDS BE STOPPED?, a one hour program from the Knowledge Network's science documentary series HORIZON. The virus that causes AIDS has been studied more intensively than almost any other disease-causing organism. Yet, AIDS continues to spread around the globe at epidemic rates.

Part Two, AIDS AND THE ARTS, documents the response of Canadian artists to AIDS. This half hour program looks at individual artists and their art and shows a powerful reflection of what AIDS is doing to all of us.

Part Three, AIDS AND THE FUTURE, is a half hour look at historical attitudes to disease and the diseased. AIDS sufferers are being barred from schools and the work place; sex education is being taught in the context of an incurable disease; and our civil rights are being threatened by the spectra of compulsory testing.

Parts Four and Five, INTIMATE CONTACT, is a compelling British drama. This four hour program is the first to examine the AIDS issue from a heterosexual point-of-view. INTIMATE CONTACT is the story of Clive and Ruth Gregory a well-off couple about to celebrate their 25th wedding anniversary. When Clive is diagnosed as having AIDS, picked up from a sexual encounter with a prostitute, the Gregorys' world begins to fall apart.

Part Six, A DEATH IN THE FAMILY, is a one hour program from New Zealand. It is a well written and acted drama about Andrew Boyd, the forth person to die of AIDS in New Zealand. His death and how his gay friends and conservative farming family deal with it is the central theme of A DEATH IN THE FAMILY.

AIDS: QUEST FOR UNDERSTANDING wraps up with a live panel discussion from the Knowledge Network's studios. The panel, selected from the Network's Aids Advisory Committee, will also be answering questions. Viewers may call in locally or via a toll-free 800 number during the program.
