#### A NOTE FROM COUNSELLING

Instructors will occasionally find themselves in time consuming counselling situations with some of their students.

When counselling a student, an instructor may soon discover that the student's stress is temporarily defused, but that nothing has been resolved. The problems re-occur. Some students are found to have an incredible number of serious problems. A few students may become unpredictable and manifest violent or other aggressive behaviour. Occasionally, a student will threaten an instructor, who is only trying to listen and help.

Please note that the professional counsellors working in the Counselling Department not only provide educational and career counselling, but also personal and crisis counselling services. They are trained to assess a client, and develop an efficient course of action. Subsequently, some students will be seen on a short term basis by the counsellors. Other students will be referred to the Campus Health Services (doctor, nurse, psychiatrist, psychologist) or to professionals and/or agencies in the community.

Finally, students manifesting disciplinary related behaviorial problems are to be referred through Department Heads to the campus disciplinary committee. When in doubt, confer with your Department Head and, if need be, with a counsellor.

Any of the counsellors will be happy to meet with you and answer questions regarding services.



## Employee Perceptions of the Working Atmosphere at VCC

A Summary of the College Climate Survey Results

All regular V.C.C. employees were surveyed in October 1988, to assess whether they had perceived changes in the working atmosphere of the College since our Institutional Evaluation survey in 1986. The survey tested employee perceptions of twenty-one aspects of their working environments.


Of the 1300 employees surveyed, 44% responded -- nearly twice the response rate for the 1986 study. By campus, response rates were quite consistent.

#### The Results:


For almost all items, employees perceived that conditions in their work areas have improved since 1986.

Employees were most happy with their own attitudes related to work performance (their willingness to help students, to resolve problems and to cooperate with other employees) and with their working relationships with their supervisors or department heads. Employees also perceive that these conditions have improved the most since 1986. Here are examples:

### Employee's Tendency to Go the Extra Mile to Help Students




### Confidence Which the Supervisor Shows in the Employee's Work



Employee Perceptions of Change Since 1986


Employees complained about communications more than anything else. Here is an example:

# General Morale in Employee's Department



Employee Perception of Change

Morale was the only topic about which employees reported that conditions have worsened. From comments included with the responses, this dissatisfaction can be linked to frustrations related to salaries and workloads, in addition to communications.

About one-third of the respondents added specific comments to their questionnaire responses. Each of these comments has been reviewed by the and a member of the College Board's Institutional Evaluation Implementation Committee.

An Analysis:

October 1988 was not a tranquil time at VCC. Funding was far less than adequate-again. Hundreds of potential students had been turned away. Faculty on two campuses were at a critical time in collective bargaining. There was upsetting discussion of administrative reorganization.

Nevertheless, and with response rates higher than in previous surveys, employees perceived that the general college climate is positive and better than in 1986. However, indications are that the broadening of involvement in decision-making, salary levels, and workloads are issues that need addressing if the climate of the college is to continue to improve.

With January's Promotion now over, the moment of truth has at last arrived. So, how many Jelly Beans were actually contained within the jar: 1,749.


