Letters from China: Maureen Hynes

As I nervously prepared for my trip to China to visit a friend teaching English in Chongqing, imagine my joy and interest to find an new title in the library describing one Canadian ESL teacher's experience teaching at Sichuan University in the early 80's. Maureen Hynes reminds me of so many of the ESL instructors at KEC - dedicated, hard-working, idealistic - that I felt an instant rapport with her as she described the excitement and challenge of teaching in China.

Like ESL students in North America, she was at first the outsider, unable to communicate, read signs or understand the intricacies of the culture. But because she had the sensitivity needed in ESL teaching, she was able to gain the confidence and respect to of her students as she learned to adapt to her new environment. In fact, Maureen adapted so well that she and her Canadian colleague rarely had a private moment. Each was in demand to teach, lecture on all topics imaginable, be available for late night soirees and discussions, and participate in lavish feasts of delicious spicy Sichuan food.

For a fascinating foray into the new China as seen through the eyes of a Canadian ESL teacher, I highly recommend "Letters from China".

YES FOLKS, IT'S TIME TO PREPARE FOR THE LABATT'S LITE 10th ANNUAL 24 HOUR RELAY!! It's time once again to dust off those runners and don your form-fitting spandex for the most challenging and fun (not to mention exhausting and foolhardy) 24 hours of your life!

For those of you who don't know anything about the Relay, the purpose is to raise money for the B.C. Lion's Society for Crippled Children. Each year there are approximately 155 teams of 20 runners each who suit up and brave the elements to raise money for crippled children. The money is raised through the collection of pledges. The pledges are given based on the number of miles completed by the team in a 24-hour period. Each team member completes the 2.5 mile course approximately four to five times within this 24-hour period (the number of times depends on how fast the runners on the Team are). Last year the event raised \$856,750 and our Team, the "VCC No-Name Runners", raised \$2,620. This year, with college-wide support, our aim is to raise \$4,000. Go Team!

For all you slackers from last year who had designated runners for your midnight runs, in the interests of fairness and justice, there will be NO SUBSTITUTIONS this year. It causes too much confusion for time-keeping volunteers and the other team members. In the event that someone drops out of the race due to injury or wimpedness the Team will continue running with only 19 runners (as per the rule and regulations of the Relay).

Our team consists of more than just runners! We'll need support personnel in the stands to cheer us on and act as timekeepers. 


