WHAT ELSE IS NEW IN THE KEC LEARNING CENTRE?

The KEC Learning Centre, ESL/Humanities side, now has Reading Skills Development materials available for student use. Beginners ESL or Literacy students can work with Reading for Understanding I, or with SRA 1a. Intermediate students can also do the higher levels of SRA 1a or go into SRA 2a. Advanced students will find the higher levels of SRA 2a appropriate, or they can try The Curious Reader, which has 7 levels of difficulty. All the reading materials have clear instructions on use and answer keys so students can work independently. The tutor will give placement test for the Reading for Understanding and SRA programs so that students are sure to begin reading at a level appropriate to their ability. Records of student progress in reading programs will also be maintained by the tutors.

A BOOK REVIEW BY APHRODITE HARRIS

The Joy Luck Club by Amy Tan

What <u>is</u> the Joy Luck Club? It is a group of four women who immigrated from China to San Francisco after 1949. Now, as mothers of grown daughters, the women play mah jong, socialize, prepare and eat dim sum, and "say" stories. Their stories, as well as those of their daughters, form this stunning first novel by Amy Tan.

Through the voices of the four mothers and their daughters, we hear both the tales of a traditional China and those of settling and living in North America. As narrators alternate, the mothers speak of arranged marriages and despotic mothers-in-law, of being the child of the "third concubine," of fleeing war and abandoning twin babies at a roadside.

The daughters tell stories too. Although dreams of China may be embedded in their souls, they live and seek love and fortune like other young women of their generation, free to make choices that bring them both independence and alienation, happiness and sorrow.

But it is the mothers and daughters talking to each other that makes <u>The Joy Luck Club</u> an unbeatable read. Like mothers everywhere, the older women learn the rules of their new society quickly to enhance their children's success in growing up. The daughters are pushed into being academic, chess or piano prodigies or into adopting the latest Shirley Temple look.

As adults, the daughters have benefitted materially from their mothers' coaxing, urging, sacrificing, only to find themselves still perplexed by who they are and what life means to them. But not to fear, the older women of the Joy Luck Club are still around to offer advice and wisdom to their grown up daughters. One of them, Ying-Ying St. Clair, witnesses her daugher's empty and loveless marriage and comments by making oblique derogatory remarks about the young couple's expensive but architecturally austere and barren house. And when Jing-Mei Woo's mother dies, the other women of the Joy Luck Club are there to finish the story, urging the young woman to return to China to learn the fate of her older half-sisters.

The Joy Luck Club offers a glimpse into the lives of immigrant Chinese women and their children, but it also talks to us of our relationships with our parents and the traditions they represent. Barbara Gerber, Helen Spencer and I think highly of Joy Luck Club. I think others will too. Available in the KEC Library.


