The Vancouver Public Library is planning to revitalize the entire Library system? The first phase of this project is to build a new Central Library on a new downtown site and a new branch to fill a current gap in the Renfrew Collingwood area.

Why? It's time! Your Central Library simply cannot handle the future. There is no more space for books and even less space for people. The building is over 30 years old and its electrical, heating and cooling systems are operating beyond capacity.

# WHAT IS A.B.E.S.A.P.?

ABESAP is a program funded by the provincial government to provide <u>tuition fees only</u> for needy students. (Maximum of \$360.00 for 4 months of study). Only one application per term, or 1 application for 4 months of study.

# WHO IS ELIGIBLE TO APPLY?

You can apply for ABESAP if you are a Canadian citizen, landed immigrant or have refugee status. All students with S.I.N. starting with 900 must show citizenship papers. ABESAP is available for students enroling in one of the following programs offered at V.C.C.-King Edward Campus:

- A.S.E.H.I / A.S.E.V.I.

- Basic Education (ABE foundations)

- B.E.S.T.

- B.T.S.D. Level 3 (ABE intermediate)

- B.T.S.D. Youth

### HOW CAN I APPLY?

One month before registration date, you can pick up an ABESAP application from the Financial Aid Office (#4029) or the Counselling Career Centre (#3002).

# \* RETURNING STUDENTS (pink form)

If you are a <u>returning</u> student (have a K.E.C. student number), you must have the teacher's comment section #20 on your application completed before returning your ABESAP application to the Financial Aid Office. <u>Returning</u> students are advised to complete their application as quickly as possible. It takes two weeks to process your application. You can apply one month before you register!!!

# \* <u>NEW STUDENTS</u> (green form)

If you are a <u>NEW</u> student (no K.E.C. student number), you can submit your application to the Financial Aid Office (#4029). You do <u>not</u> have to complete section #20 (teacher's comments) on your application form. You can apply one month before you register !!!

# \* DEADLINE FOR APPLICATION IS ONE MONTH AFTER THE FIRST DAY OF CLASSES

# PLEASE NOTE:

1) ALL full-time students who are being supported by the Ministry of Social Services and Housing (welfare) must first apply to MSSH for assistance and have MSSH provide a letter of refusal if they will not pay your tuition fees. Part-time students do <u>not</u> require a letter from MSSH.





# Computer Corner

For the past two weeks, we have been discussing ASCII files. This prompted the following question:

Question: Why would I need to save a file as an ASCII (ASKEE) file? Answer: The most common reason for saving a file as an ASCII file is to copy text from one program to another. For example, if you had long been using a word processing package, and then realized that it might be simpler to use one of the more popular packages such as MS WORD or WordPerfect, you would not need to retype all your existing documents. You would merely convert them to ASCII files and then import them into your new word processor.

Another reason for converting a file to ASCII format would be to send it to another computer user using an electronic mail messaging service. For example, if I wished to contact an instructor at North Island College, I could create the text on my word processor, save it as ASCII, then load my communications software, turn on my modem, log on to my messaging service and send the file from my disk through the phone lines to that instructor's E-mail address. When it was retrieved, a reply would probably be sent to my E-mail address

If you have any computer related question, whether very general, such as the type of software best suited to your needs, or a specific how-to question, leave it in my mail box, and I will answer it or have it answered for you as soon as possible.

# KEC AUTO COLLISION INSTRUCTORS INITIATES AN INNOVATIVE LIAISON PROGRAM WITH LOCAL HIGH SCHOOLS

"Me take trades training? Now way! It's for drop outs... Low pay... No status."

Many people not familiar with the trades and in particular the Mechanical Trades are not aware of the dramatic technological changes that have occurred in Automotive, Auto Collision Repair and Diesel Mechanics over the past five years. For a start, the names of the courses have been changed to reflect the increasingly technical nature of each field. We now offer four programs:

Automotive Technician Program (8 Months)

Automotive Collision Repair Program (6 Months)

Automotive Painting and Refinishing Technical Program (3 Months)

Diesel Mechanic Repair (12 Months)

Graduates from the Mechanical Trades programs are finding jobs, earning excellent salaries and benefit packages, have job security and have a good working environment, thanks to technological advances.

To get this message across to the public schools, the Auto Collision Repair instructors have recently developed in an innovative program to educate industrial education teachers working in the public school system and to provide hands on mini learning experiences in auto collision repair for interested students.

Beginning on a pilot basis last year the Auto Collision instructors invited teachers and students from New Westminster Senior Secondary School and Churchill Senior Secondary School to spend a few days working along side KEC instructors and students in the Auto Collision and Auto Painting Program. This year they have broadened the program to include Delta Senior Secondary School which will be sending 4 groups of 6 students and their instructors to spend one week each working in a special mini work experience program in the Auto Collision Repair Shop. Later in the year Gladstone Senior Secondary School will send a group of 12 students to enjoy a similar experience.

The feedback from the high schools has been fantastic. The Mini Program provides an excellent training experience for the students and often motivates them to return to their school programs

with increased enthusiasm for the trade. Several have already enrolled or applied for admission to the Auto Collision Repair program. It also provided an excellent opportunity for the Industrial Education teachers to become aware of the technological advances in the field and to upgrade their skills.

Once again congratulations on a job well done. The program has been great.
